



volunteerism by Lois Jarrett

In early June I had the opportunity to represent Buffalo Branch at a conference on volunteerism sponsored by the Volunteer Administrators of WNY. For a period of about ten years, the entire concept of volunteerism has been evolving. Both the volunteer and the individual directing the volunteer have learned that "doing good" is no longer enough.

A volunteer program is founded on mutual trust and respect with benefits for the agency or organization and with benefits for the volunteers. An understanding of why people volunteer is obviously very important:

1. Affiliation is a strong factor, especially for those individuals who are people oriented. Altruism is involved here as well as a desire for friendship.
2. Power is an important variable for people who are leaders or teachers or for people who are considered influential. This power may be either a personal power or a social power.
3. Achievement is perceived as an outstanding element for the task-oriented individual, taking the form of either goal achievement or skill achievement.
4. Career development motivates many people both from the standpoint of networking to find a better job or to find better employees.
5. Enjoyment cannot be too strongly stressed. Without some kernel of pleasure of some kind, the volunteer will consider the fact that the work is voluntary and may well develop negative feelings toward the work involved and/or the organization or agency.

EDUCATIONAL FOUNDATION

DISSERTATION FELLOWSHIPS Dissertation Fellowships are available for women who will complete all required course work and examinations for the doctorate, except the dissertation defense, by December 31 of the year prior to the fellowship year. It is expected the fellowship will be used for the final year of doctoral work and that the degree will be received at the end of the fellowship year. There are no restrictions as to place of study. Tuition for additional course work is not available through Dissertation Fellowships.

Awards are for \$10,000 for a twelve-month period beginning July 1. Fellows are expected to devote full time to their projects during the fellowship year.

SELECTED PROFESSIONS FELLOWSHIPS Selected Professions Fellowships assist women in the final year of their degree programs in the fields of architecture, business administration, dentistry, engineering, law, medicine, and veterinary medicine. Applicants must be full-time students at accredited U.S. institutions. MBA applicants must be students in two-year programs at institutions accredited by the American Assembly of Collegiate Schools of Business. Engineering applicants must complete all required course work and examinations for the doctorate, except the dissertation defense, by December 31 of the year prior to the fellowship year.


Awards range from \$3,500 to \$9,000 for one academic year (September to June). Applicants must be ready to begin the final year of their degree program in the fall following their application.

REFORM OF VOTER
REGISTRATION LAWS

AAUW members who worked on the Women's Vote Project became aware of many barriers to voter registration efforts. While 80 to 90 percent of eligible voters in many European countries vote, only 53 percent of eligible American voters actually voted in the 1984 national elections. Many feel that this is due to laws and administrative practices that make registration significantly more difficult in the United States than in any other democratic country.

Congress is beginning to address some of these concerns. Five bills have been introduced to reform registration procedures and thus expand voter participation in the United States:

- * HR 1453 would allow all voters to register by mail for federal elections, as is already the case in 22 states.
- * HR 1454 eliminates registration deadlines and allows registration on election day, as four states currently do.
- * HR 1668 would provide carbon copies of change-of-address forms to help officials purge voter lists and re-register voters who move. The Senate counterpart is S1429.
- * Hr 2216 allows election officials to mail voter registration forms, absentee ballots, and related materials free of charge to eligible voters.
- * HR 3066 would establish a \$60 million federal grant program for states which establish door-to-door, postcard, same-day or other voter registration systems.


Nominees Sought



LAST CHANCE TO SAVE ON LIFE MEMBERSHIP

In September, we reported in the Newsletter that between October 1, 1985, and January 1, 1986, life membership dues will be computed using the new formula with the old rates, resulting in a bargain for members, one which will never be repeated. A life membership during that three-month period will cost only \$255, minus the amount already paid for this new year, or \$242.25. The cost after January 1 will be \$440.

Life membership means that you will never again need to pay Association dues, just division and branch. As Association dues will be \$22 annually, effective January 1, 1986, we hope AAUW members will seriously consider the savings resulting in taking advantage of this offer. However, remember that it is only available until January 1.

ERIE COUNTY TASK FORCE
TO STUDY WOMEN'S ISSUES

County Executive Rutkowski recently announced a task force has been formed in Erie County to concentrate on women's issues including such areas as sex discrimination, legislation affecting women, and available resources and services for women in Erie County.

The 19 women appointed to this task force represent a wide spectrum of government, community and business organizations. Chairwoman is Marjorie L. Girth, law professor at the State University of Buffalo. Also on this task force is one of our AAUW members, Phyllis Truran representing the YWCA.


According to an article by Peter Grant in the Buffalo News, "The task force will present its report next September. The panel will try to document cases of sex discrimination in housing, recreation, employment, education and community services. It also will look into the possibility of establishing a permanent commission on the status of women in the county."

Phyllis Truran relates to us that this task force differs from a commission in that it is simply a one-year task force without funding or staff. Letters are being sent out to a number of women's organizations for input, and AAUW should be receiving a letter.
