## Compromise Dues Increase Passes

At the Association Convention in Columbus last June, a compromise was reached on the amount of dues increase to be paid by members. The current Association (national) dues are \$12.75 annually, an amount which does not pay for mandated services. A proposed dues increase to \$28 was felt by most delegates to be excessive, however, and much time was spent in trying to reach a compromise position. The final figure agreed upon is \$22, which was reached through some interesting parliamentary maneuvering.

The effective date of the increase is January 1, 1986, meaning that any dues paid before that date will be at the old rate. This leads to an interesting situation in regard to life memberships.

The former cost of a life membership was \$285. Effective October 1, 1985, this figure will change to "a one-time payment of Association dues the year she elects to become a life member." This means that for the time between October 1 and January 1, the life membership dues will be computed using the new formula with the old rates. The result is a bargain for members, one which will never be repeated. A life membership during that three-month period will cost only \$255, minus the amount already paid for this new year, or \$242.25. The cost after January 1 will be \$440. Now that is REALLY a bargain! Life membership means that you will never again need to pay Association dues, just division and branch. Sylvia Volk, Membership VP, has life membership applications.

Let's celebrate our accomplishments!

The Buffalo Branch was congratulated for its efforts in support of the Educational Foundation by the New York State Division Board. Our check for \$3,000 from the Book Sale was deposited in the Buffalo Branch Endowment.

The local Board voted to honor the following members with named gifts this year: Grace K. Blackstone, Marion S. Fay, Ruth M. Seitz, and Carol J. Stull.

For the last two years, Buffalo Branch has ranked fourth among the ten highest contributors per capita and third among the ten highest in total giving in the NYS Division.

The New York Division proclaims this year's total gift of \$64,198.11. This amount placed us among the top ten states in the nation for total contributions. We were among the top ten divisions honored during Foundation Night at the Columbus Convention.

The Division was fortunate to have one Research Project for which an Individual Member Grant was awarded to a Rochester Branch member. Other awards included eight American Fellows, four American Fellows Selected Professions and four International Fellows studying within New York State.

The NYSD is proud of its continuing support for EFP. Our support can only be a reality by the hard work, dedication, and enthusiasm of the members who promote the work of the Foundation.

# Women's Work/ Women's Worth by Jeanne Moran

The 1985-86 year will see AAUW beginning a new issue--Women's Work/Women's Worth. As issue chairperson, it is a pleasure for me to introduce to the Buffalo Branch this timely and provocative issue. Alice McKee, Association Interim Issue Chairman, has put together an introduction to this issue that I would like to share with the Buffalo Branch.

"In 1980, the programme of the World Conference of the UN Decade for Women stated 'Women comprise one-third of the paid work force, perform two-thirds of all the world's work, receive one-tenth of the world's wages, and own less than 1 percent of the world's wealth.' The work that women do, the little value ascribed to that work by the economic system, and the growing rate of poverty among women is an inevitable and predictable sequence of the unequal relationship that exists between women's work and women's worth. Universally a woman's work is undervalued and her worth is, therefore, undermined.

"Women all over the world share three important aspects of their working life. They perform a great variety of tasks during a working day. They typically work a long day--longer, usually, than their male counterpart; and their output is accorded little economic value. . . . This is the commonality that sets the work world of women apart from that of men."

Please join with me this coming year as we explore this new issue and learn to value our worth as women.

# Buffalo's LOANS for EDUCATION

The Buffalo Branch of AAUW now has its own "Loans for Education." Approval was given by Internal Revenue Service for a fund to be administered in the same way as the Chamberlin Loan Fund and to accept tax-deductible gifts and contributions.


A portion of board-designated receipts from the Book Sale is to go to this fund, which will be available to area residents. The loans may be applied to expenses at accredited colleges of the students' choice.

Donations may be made to "Loans for Education, Buffalo Branch AAUW" through the Assistant Treasurer, Dr. Caren Shapiro. Acknowledgement will be sent to the honoree or her family.

Applications and brochures describing both funds are available through Chamberlin Loan Fund or Loans for Education, 244 Callodine Avenue, Buffalo, NY 14226. Those who have not completed applications for the fall term may apply for the winter semester. Interviews for the 1986 winter semester will be held during the Christmas holidays.

The loan fund committee will bring the results of summer applications and interviews to the meeting of the Board of Directors in September.

Members are urged to encourage eligible students to apply.

# LEGISLATIVE PROGRAM

## by N. Anne Montes



The AAUW Legislative Program for 1985-87 follows a long tradition of commitment to responsible public participation. The present program was presented in the February 1985 Graduate Woman months before the convention to give members ample time for consideration before final approval. It is not a program arbitrarily made up by Association leaders and staff but one originating from members' recommendations and thus reflects beliefs and commitments of those members actively involved. You too can and should be a part of this process.

The priorities listed for this program are as follows:

### 1. Rights of the individual

\*Passage and ratification of the ERA.

\*Individual choice in determination of one's reproductive life.

\*Measures to ensure pay equity.

### 2. Community

\*Revisions in Social Security, retirement, insurance, and welfare.

\*Measures to control environmental pollution and protect and restore water quality with particular attention to toxic, radioactive and hazardous wastes.

### 3. Cultural Policy

\*Public funding for arts and humanities.

### 4. Educational Policy

\*Improved and equitable funding to promote quality education.

\*Reinstatement and vigorous enforcement of Title IX and other measures that promote educational equity for women and girls.

\*Nondiscriminatory student financial aid programs to increase opportunities in post secondary education.

\*Opposition to tuition tax credits and other diversions of public funds to non-public elementary and secondary schools.

### 4. International relations

\*Reduction of the military budget and measures that require the Department of Defense to meet the same standards of efficiency and public accountability expected of other federal agencies.

All proposed legislation at all levels of government that impact on these priorities will be our focus for education and action for the period 1985-87.

Legislative information from month to month will be updated so that these goals can be met.
