

It is a tribute to the leadership, enthusiasm, and hard work of many members to merit mention in the Leader in Action, a national publication of the Association which is sent to division and branch leaders across the country. The Symposium was sponsored by Tri-County Interbranch Council made up of the Buffalo, East Aurora, Lyndonville-Medina-Middleport, and Niagara Area branches of AAUW.

If you received an AAUW calendar and sent in your contribution by mid-January, you should NOT have received a follow-up letter in early February. Over the last two years, the Association has raised more than \$188,000 in non-dues revenue with programs like this one.

AAUW's national study of the worth of women's unpaid work in the home and as volunteers is scheduled to begin in fall 1987. The study, which will be a major component of the WW/WW Issue for 1987–88, will include a survey of how women spend their unpaid time and an analysis of the impact of such factors as women's unprecedented participation in the paid work force. NEW ISSUE TO BE INTRODUCED

A new issue, "Promoting Individual Liber is being developed for presentation at the Association Convention to be held in Houston June 20-24, 1987. Issue action will focus on three areas:

-Reinstatement and vigorous enforcement of Title IX and other measures aimed at ensuring equal opportunities.

-Protection of academic and intellectual freedom on college and university campuses and in elementary and secondary schools and public libraries.

-Developing understanding among AAUW members of threats to individual liberties, providing information and materials to help branches educate their communities about those threats, and increasing members' ability to respond to such efforts.
