## PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE by PAT SEAVER

The Buffalo Branch has taken a stand in opposition to censorship efforts in the community. Last fall we joined the Western New York Coalition for Public Education where we are enthusiastically and ably representated by our Area Representative for Education, Barbara Paulson. More recently, Barbara Carier and I participated in a Buffalo Board of Education meeting and read a statement objecting to School Board Member James Comerford's attempt to remove a textbook from use in the Buffalo City Schools. We also urged the Board to adopt procedures which can deal with challenges to instructional material and subject matter discussed in classrooms in order to protect educators and students from censorship.

Stacey Johnson, Barbara Carier, and I attended the New York State Division's Board of Directors' Winter Board Meeting which was held in Albany January 9-11. The main agenda item was the 1987 Division Convention to be held at the Buffalo Hyatt Regency Hotel April 24-26. The Convention program promises to be an exciting one, and I hope many of you will take advantage of its location to attend many of the excellent workshops and programs that are planned. Look for registration information in the April newsletter.

The NYSD Legislative Committee has approved the following priorities for 1987: support for sex equity in education, toxic victims, domestic violence and economic equity in the areas of pay, higher education, insurance and pension reform, day care, divorce and support, volunteerism, and displaced homemakers. Members are urged to write their NYS Senators to oppose \$59 (sponsored by Marchi and Nolan) which would provide for tuition tax credits.
