## PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



Many of you have expressed pleasure with the new Women Artists Calendar. Prints of the paintings illustrated may be available in the future. Suggestions about improving the program are welcome. Send them to Calendar Program, AAUW Sales Office, 2401 Virginia Avenue, NW, Washington, DC 20037.

Over the last two years, the Association has raised more than \$188,000 in non-dues revenue with programs like this one. This allows the Association to provide quality services without raising dues. No AAUW funds are involved in the printing, mailing or other parts of this program. All financial risks are borne by the calendar company; the program costs AAUW nothing.

If you did not order a calendar but received one, it is not necessary to return it. The recent follow-up letter signed by Anne Bryant asking for payment for the calendar was supposed to go only to members who received the calendar but did not contribute. You should ignore the letter if you have either contributed, returned the calendar, or sent in a "no" request. The calendar company was at fault and bears the cost not only for that mailing, but also for a follow-up memo to branch presidents explaining and apologizing for their error.

Since our fiscal year runs from July 1 to June 30, dues must be in to Treasurer, Bunny Blackstone, by June 30.


The Association has a deadline for all national dues to be sent by the branches, after which time members who have not renewed will be dropped from the Association computer.

### WIDE: Workshops in Developing Effectiveness

The WIDE concept was developed by the New York State Division to develop techniques for workshop design and facilitation. The WIDE workshops are developed from the most recent human resources material and are designed to provide participants with a dynamic and memorable experience in adult learning.

The WIDE team's experienced facilitators have made presentations to colleges, boards of directors, and hundreds of community organizations in the areas of (1) problem solving; (2) skills development such as leadership training, and (3) personal skills development, such as time management or conflict management and (4) public advocacy.

The WIDE team also designs workshops on timely issues which may be coordinated with the Association Issues or priority areas. For example, the WIDE team's facilitators are trained in the presentation of five different workshops that address various aspects of the issue of PEACE. The WIDE team has recently developed workshops on censorship to coordinate with the priorities of the Public Support for Public Education Issue and the forthcoming Preserving Individual Liberties Issue.

AAUW members who are interested in serving on the WIDE team as facilitators may be trained in these techniques. WIDE workshops are available to groups for an evening two-hour workshop or a daytime seminar. Fees vary according to the size of the group and the service orientation of the organization. 

The goals of the group are : tours to sites where opera is being performed; lectures and discussions on opera; newsletters with information relevant to opera-related activities.


