Did you know that the AAUW is the oldest and largest national organization working for education and the advancement of women? Founded in 1881 as the Association of Collegiate Alumnae, which merged with the Western Association of Collegiate Women in 1921, AAUW now has more than 175,000 members. The purpose of AAUW is to promote equity for women, education and self-development over the life span, and positive societal change.

Our branch is one of AAUW's more than 1,800 local units in communities nationwide. It is primarily through the branches that AAUW's priorities are identified, its programs implemented, and its goals achieved.

Divisions are the statewide organizations of branches in the fifty states and the District of Columbia. The Association is the national organization to which every AAUW member belongs. The Association is governed by a volunteer board of directors who are elected to two-year terms at biennial conventions held in odd-numbered years. The Association Board and committees represent the entire membership and establish policy in accordance with the AAUW Charter and Bylaws.

#### DRUG TESTING IN ERIE COUNTY

The Eric County Legislature will decide soon whether mandatory drug testing of county employees should be implemented. AAUW has been asked to join a coalition to oppose such a move on the basis that mandatory across-the-board drug testing without cause is an infringement on a citizen's right to privacy. Such a stand does not conflict with Association policy, and it is up to each branch to decide whether to take a position.

### AAUW CALENDAR PROGRAM

The AAUW calendar program will replace the greeting card program through which the Association has raised over \$180,000 in non-dues revenue in the last two fiscal years. All AAUW members will receive the initial mailing unless they have notified the Educational Center that they wish their name removed from the solicitation mailing list. It you want to receive the calendar, you do nothing. If you do not want to receive the calendar, you must mark the return card "no" and return it in the postage-paid envelope.

All the costs of this program are paid by the calendar company, which is not the same vendor who promoted the greeting card program. AAUW funds are not used to print, produce, or mail the calendars or any of the letters or other mailing pieces. The calendar company takes all the financial risks in the program.
