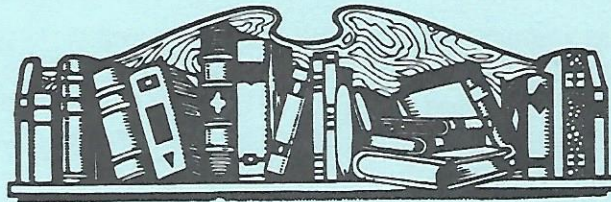

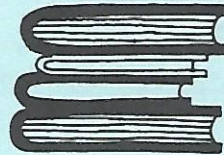

THE MANY BENEFITS OF OUR EFP BOOK SALE

The profit from our 1988 EFP Book Sale was \$8,016. That money benefits the Association Educational Foundation, our local Loans for Education and the Branch's special projects fund. However, there are many other benefits from our Book Sale.

Our Book Sale is a worthwhile community service:

In an age in which illiteracy is a great concern, our Book Sale makes reading materials available at prices everyone can afford.

A child can spend one week's allowance at our sale and purchase more books than he can carry.

A college student or new professional can start his professional library inexpensively without sacrificing quality.

We make available books which are no longer in print or are unavailable in bookstores, such as foreign books.

We are "recycling" reading materials which might otherwise be added to our growing garbage problem.

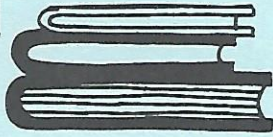
Agencies and charities are invited to take at no cost our leftover books at the end of the sale.

The Association's Educational Foundation Program provides women scholars with grants and fellowships to pursue graduate and post doctoral studies. The EFP also provides community grants such as those which funded our Women's Health Symposium and our Day Care Directory.

Our local Loans for Education makes interest-free loans available to local women who are pursuing undergraduate or graduate degrees.

Our special projects fund makes it possible for us to fund such projects as our Nursing Home Directory.

The Book Sale provides our Branch with visibility in the community. Perhaps the greatest benefit to our members is that the Book Sale gives each member a chance to work with and get to know the most interesting, intelligent, caring women in Buffalo--the members of the AAUW-Buffalo Branch!

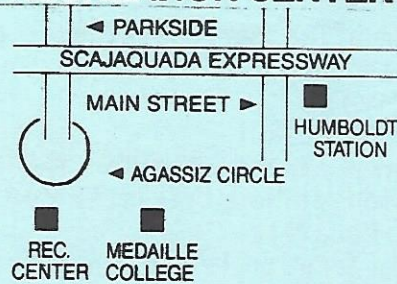

A total of \$13,000 from Chamberlin and \$2,500 from our Fund was given.
