CHAMBERLIN LOAN: OUR WAY TO HELP STUDENTS

Are you aware of the Branch loan funds for women students? These are different from the EFP grants and scholarships.

Chamberlin Loan Fund offers interest-free loans to full-time students who qualify after successfully completing one year of a degree program. Money for these loans comes from the income of the Sarah Chamberlin bequest which was left in trust to AAUW Buffalo Branch and from the repayment of loans.

Loans for education, Buffalo Branch, provides similar loans and/or grants to students who may or may not be full-time degreeseekers. Money for this comes from one-half of the Book Sale admission fees, gifts, and bequests. Members are urged to make memorial gifts to this fund.

Applications for both funds are available from the Chair, Marion Elmer. Information and gift cards for making donations may be secured from the Treasurer, Ruth Seitz. Committee members include Rita Dielman, Violet Gordon, Margaret Haas, Josephine Herman, Myra Menti, MaryAlice Seagrave, and Mary Weppner.


