Branch Member Survey

If you have not completed and returned the survey enclosed with last month's newsletter, please take the time now. The information obtained from those returned last year was very helpful in identifying leadership for the branch and planning programs. Responses from every member would make the data more valuable. If you have not responded (last year or last month), we encourage you to do so today.

BOOK SALE

We've successfully completed another book sale despite the enormous amount of work that goes into this event. I want to thank the 120 members who donated their time to sorting and pricing, and the sale. This does not include those who worked on committees or donated cash and/or items to the sale. Each of you should also thank yourselves for a job well done. I must say that panic quickly set in when I saw the pile of books to process but my panic ebbed as the pile decreased and everything was finished when the doors opened for the sale. We worked 801 woman-hours sorting and pricing over a period of 13 days with most of the work being done between 9:30 and 5:00. An estimated 328 woman-hours were spent on the sale (many people neglected to sign out) and another 43.5 woman-hours spent on clean-up, an area we could use more volunteer help with. This does not include the many hours spent planning, publicizing, collecting, calling, etc. We netted approximately \$6000 for our efforts this year. Congratulations! However, this could have been increased if we didn't have to discard so many books. Before you lament about the valuable books being wasted, be advised that most of them were out dated textbooks, with estimates ranging from 1/2 to 2/3 of the total. It cost \$700 to dump left over books so we could save at least \$350 in dumping fees alone if we didn't accept donations of textbooks. This does not include the costs of storing them, transporting them, paying workers to handle them, or renting tables to display them. And it does not include the valuable time our volunteers spent handling them. Sales of textbooks brought in about \$100 which hardly offsets the costs we incurred. I highly recommend that we do not accept textbooks as donations.

Finally, I want to thank my committee again for all their help and especially for their reassurance that things would work out. I had to rely on the experience of others because, as some of you already know, I had never even been to an AAUW book sale. My personal thanks to:





Ombudsmen Needed

The Town of Amherst Long Term Care Ombudsman program and the American Red Cross need volunteers to act as patient advocates in area nursing and adult homes.

Certified ombudsman volunteers investigate complaints at the request of residents or patients, and work with the facilities to ensure that patients' rights are respected.

A 36-hour training program will be provided by the New York State Office for the Aging in October. Topics covered include patient care, Medicaid, and community resources, among others. After training, a commitment of about 6 hours per week is required.
