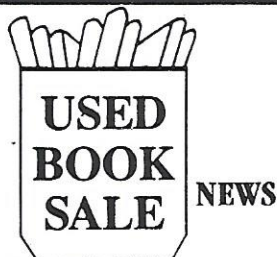

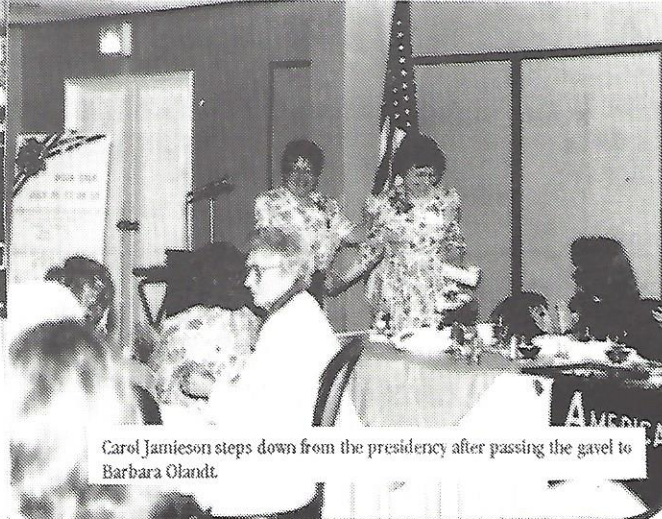
May 1991 Annual Meeting & Luncheon



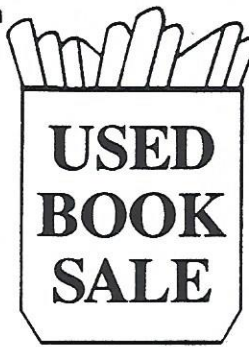

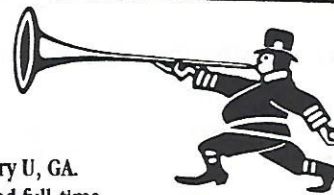


Barbara Olandt, President 1991-92 (L) and Carolyn Day, President-elect.
