Education and Equity

here do we go from here? Planning is underway for a major community event on March 25, 1995, focusing on issues of equity at all levels of education and in the workplace. Members are encouraged to become involved and/or watch for developments and help promote what promises to be an informative, stimulating, and significant western New York event. Suzanne Grossman, former Buffalo Branch president, and Sue Oliver, from the East Aurora-Southtowns Branch, are providing the leadership for this activity, which is being sponsored by the Tri-County Interbranch Council.

In addition to this, Buffalo Branch members have expressed an interest and willingness to be involved in a greater outreach to the western New York community through special presentations on sexual harassment and equity issues. Barbara Carier, Education Representative, and Ann Hicks, Equity Coordinator, would like to continue to explore ways (along with the presentations) to effectively disseminate a message to help prevent and curtail sexual harassment or help meet the needs of those who are dealing with it. Equity in our schools would continue to be an area of study and action. Update on Gender Equity Bills

he Senate approved the Gender Equity in Education Package as part of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act Reauthorization (S 1513) The ESEA, the federal government's largest K-12 education funding program, included provisions on teacher equity training, sexual harassment, math and science education for girls, dropout prevention for pregnant and parenting teens, and more, thanks to the efforts of AAUW members across the country.

The House has already passed its own version of ESEA. Differences between the House and Senate versions will be worked out by a conference committee in mid-September. During that time AAUW will be working to preserve all the gender equity provisions in both bills. After the conference, the bill will return to both chambers for final approval and then go to the President for signature, probably in October.



Phyllis Kelly

ave you ever stopped and seriously thought abut what your AAUW membership means to you? I had the distinct pleasure of talking with Phyllis Kelly, one of our distinguished members, and these are some of her thoughts regarding her membership in AAUW:

Phyllis informed me that she has been a member of AAUW for over 25 years. Right after college she joined as many new members do. Then Phyllis took time to raise her family. Once they were independent enough, she rejoined AAUW Buffalo Branch in the late 1960's.

Phyllis makes it clear that she "believes in the aims of AAUW from the national level to the state level and to our own individual Buffalo Branch level." These aims are important for all women to understand, and she would like all members "to become familiar with these aims so that the members can associate themselves with the programs of AAUW" that are a direct result of these aims.

Phyllis has some very good advice for new members, "You can't beat the networking that goes on in our AAUW organization." Part of the reason new members join AAUW is for the networking.

She adds, "Most AAUW members are so willing to share. The camaraderie and advice shared by members is so helpful. More mature members can act as mentors, and young aspiring career women can communicate with each other." Seeing that mentors and "other contemporaries have been successful is inspirational. These are the powerful and positive factors of AAUW networking. These are the factors that help a woman advance herself in her position or to help herself stay successful in her career and in her endeavors of life."

Phyllis notes that times are changing. The old AAUW of the 60s was one of educated homemakers intellectualizing about current and provocative issues that concerned them. The AAUW of today is for the modern, university-educated woman. Today it is an organization of shared decision-making steeped with problem solving issues and strong career networking avenues. The national level of AAUW is in tune with contemporary times with documentation and research on topics such as sexual equity and sexual harassment.

She says, "AAUW meant an awful lot to me years ago, and it still means a lot to me today."

September Board Meeting

he regular meeting of the Buffalo Branch Board of Directors was called to order by President Judy Weidemann at 7:05 p.m. on September 7, 1994, in the Eggertsville-Snyder Library. The minutes from the June 1994 meeting were circulated and approved as written.

President's Report - Judy gave an update on the status of appointments to board positions for 1994-95. The only addition to what appeared in the September newsletter was the used book sale facilitator. Betty Loucks has agreed to serve in this capacity for the next sale.

Judy informed the board that she had met with Sharon Rich and Bunny Blackstone to discuss plans for the year. Among other things, they have agreed to share the responsibility for attending various organizational and committee meetings as well as study groups.

She circulated the letter from the Association congratulating the Buffalo Branch on achieving 5-star status last year. The letter was turned over to the historian, Jane Riga.

Judy reported on the most recent meeting and action of the Women's Action Coalition. They are developing a position statement which would urge the inclusion of reproductive rights, including the choice of abortion in health care legislation. They would like member organizations to endorse and affix their names to the document which will be released to the press and circulated to legislators. Judy chose to bring the proposed statement to the board to be reviewed before indicating our position as a branch on the statement. She will provide copies, and we will discuss it at the October meeting.

Board members were encouraged to attend the NYS District I Fall Conference on Saturday, October 15 from 9 a.m. - 3:30 p.m. at Roberts Wesleyan College. Registration information appeared in the September newsletter.

Past President's Report - Suzanne Grossman reported that she had submitted a grant proposal to the Education Foundation for the equity conference, Equity Beginning Now, being planned in cooperation with the Tri-County Interbranch Council for March 1995. She is in the process of making arrangements to hold the program at Erie Community College North or at Medaille. Suzanne Oliver is trying to secure Peggy Orenstein, author of *School Girls*, as the keynote speaker. The next meeting of the planning committee is September 27 at 5:30 p.m. at the Original Pancake House. Anyone interested in helping with the implementation of this project is welcome to attend.

President-Elect's Report - Bunny
Blackstone informed the board that Sharon Rich,
Judy Weidemann, Eve Stoklosa, and she had
prepared a telephone survey to be conducted
between now and October 5. Board members
were asked and agreed to assist. Discussion then
focused on the auction scheduled on November
19 at the Thruway Mall. They need and are
seeking donations. It was suggested and agreed
that we change the name to Luck of the Draw
Auction.

Bunny then reported on the potluck dinner. She has received only 15 reservations. Board members assured her more would come in by the weekend. She requested volunteers to help with set up and clean up.

Bunny told the board that Sharon Rich, Diane Silvestro, Jill Brown, and she have been working on developing and/or revising job descriptions for the various book sale positions. In addition, they are developing a project time line and written policies to help provide direction

and consistency in running the book sale.

Suzanne Grossman read the letter Ruth Sicherman had sent to the Education Foundation describing her disappointment and frustration in securing publicity for the AAUW Buffalo Branch Used Book Sale. She explained that area newspapers will not carry or will limit coverage of stories for Buffalo organizations. This practice has had a negative impact on our effort to promote the book sale and raise money for the Educational Foundation. In view of this, she urged EF to allow us to change our name to the Greater Buffalo Branch. The answering letter from the Foundation's branch liaison recommended that we try again to change our branch's name and begin by requesting the change through NYS-AAUW.

Vice President for Program - Carolyn Iadovito reviewed the complete schedule of branch programs for the year. Printed copies will be available at the potluck dinner.

Vice President for Membership
Recruitment - Marlene Dick reported that we have 10 new members since June. She is launching a membership kick-off next week. She has redesigned the membership brochure and has prepared 3 pages of information to be distributed to all members in the next newsletter. The information includes 12 ways to recruit members, so she is looking for assistance from all branch members in this effort to build our membership. The next meeting of the Membership Committee is Saturday, October 1, from 10 a.m. to noon at her home.

Loans Fund Treasurer - Cindy Monacelli circulated printed reports for July and August 1994. The balance in the Chamberlin Loan account as of August 31 was \$31,212.33, while

Loans for Education had \$2,141.46.

Educational Foundation Chair - Stacey Johnson reported that the balance in the EF account is \$15,412.61. After some discussion it was agreed that \$3,000 should be kept in the account for unpaid expenses and start up expenses for the next sale. The income from the first day admissions, \$1,595, will be evenly divided between Loans for Education and branch special projects.

Chamberlin Loan Fund - Maryalice Seagrave told the board that 10 awards were given over the summer.

Legal Advocacy Fund - Carolyn Day reported that the goal for the contributions in 1994-95 would be \$1.14 per member.

Study Groups Coordinator - Judy Bratty has received suggestions to start a computer support group or club and a skiing group.

News Election Service has contacted the branch to request our assistance in monitoring election results November 8. It is a good fundraiser, so Judy will try to find someone to coordinate volunteers.

The meeting adjourned at 9 p.m. The next meeting will be held at The Cafe in the Square, Main and Harlem, beginning at 7 p.m. Members are encouraged to come at 5:30 if they would like to have dinner.
