PRESIDENT'S CORNER

Over 100 years ago a group of brave, determined women met at a convention in Seneca Falls to sign the Declaration of Sentiments which initiated the Woman's Suffrage Movement. As another year is coming to a close, we must not forget what our former leaders have accomplished for women, and we must continue to strive for improvement in the status of women. One excellent mode is to get involved. Women working together can make a difference.

We would like to thank our speakers, Dr. Nancy Rosenbloom and Lynn Marinelli, for the excellent program at the November branch meeting, . Dr. Rosenbloom (professor of history at Canisius College) spoke about the history of the Woman's Suffrage Movement, and Lynn Marinelli (director of the Erie County Commission on the Status of Women) reported on the status of women in elected positions locally and nationwide. An added bonus to the program was a tour of the newly renovated Roycroft Inn which boasts an exciting history in itself. Many thanks to the chairs, Diane Silvestro and Judy Weidemann, for organizing this memorable program. We were delighted to see 93 guests at our meeting, many from various women's organizations.

Bunny Blackstone and Judy Weidemann were horlored to attend a reception for the U.S. Ambassador to Austria, Dr. Swanee Hunt. We were impressed with Dr. Hunt's character; she truly is an excellent role model for women. She has gone the "extra mile" in organizing humanitarian support for the victims in Bosnia. She has been in the war zone to assist women in networking to rebuild a democracy. Dr. Hunt organized the Vienna Women's Initiative in an

effort to empower women and helped plan the Beijing Women's Conference. It was reported that women in Central Europe have a long way to go to establish themselves as contenders for leadership roles similar to those held by many women in our country. Dr. Hunt emphasized that we must not give up a valuable right that our ancestors won for women: the right to vote. She pointed out that 54 million women did not vote in the 1994 election. Women were urged to take a part in the shaping of democracy "which is never finished; it is always work in progress." We were delighted to hear Dr. Hunt praise AAUW's work for Equity in Education for girls and women. She is an example of one woman making a great difference in improving conditions for women and girls.

Get the Facts

Congress is Chipping Away at Women's Reproductive Rights

While Americans believe that the right to choose is protected, the anti-choice majority in the House and the near majority in the Senate have passed several bills restricting women's reproductive rights. [AAUW position is pro-choice.] Representatives Chris Smith (R-NJ) and Robert Dorman (R-CA) have said that these attempts are part of a larger campaign to end all reproductive rights. Some of these measures include:

- Some abortions are banned without exception. (HR 1833 passed by a vote of 288 to 139. Senate considers it the week of December 4th.)
- Congress permanently denies access to abortions for low-income women. (Budget act passed by Congress includes a permanent ban on using Medicaid to pay for abortions, with certain exceptions.)
- Abortion coverage is prohibited in federal health plans. (HR 2020 passed by a vote of 235 to 188 and the Senate passed it 50-44.)
- Abortions are banned in Washington, D.C. owned hospitals. (HR 2546 passed by a House of Representatives vote of 224 to 191.)

Take action: Call your Senators and Representatives or the President to indicate your support for women's reproductive rights.

Call your Senators and Representatives at 202/224-3121 and express your opinion.

Haven House is a safe shelter for abused women and children for ninety days. Counseling is provided on both an individual and group basis with the goal of informing battered women about their options and alternatives.

Children's services include educational, therapeutic, and recreational planning to assist children in coping with family crises.

Speakers at Haven House are available to clubs, churches, or schools to discuss what Haven House is doing in the area of domestic violence.

Members are saddened to hear of **Beverly Graham's** death. Graham served as program chair and treasurer for the Buffalo Branch. Our condolences to family and friends.



Mexican Coffee

1/2 cup ground coffee
1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
1/8 teaspoon ground cloves
Peels from two oranges
6 cups cold water
2 tablespoons packed brown sugar
Orange slices or wedges (optional)

Line the coffee basket of an electric drip cofeemaker with a filter. Place coffee, cinnamon, cloves, and orange peel in the filter-lined basket. Pour cold water into water compartment; let water drip through basket into coffee pot. Stir sugar into coffee. Garnish with orange slices if desired. Makes 8 servings.
