The March Board Meeting of AAUW Buffalo Branch was called to order at 7:05 P.M. at the Snyder-Eggertsville Library on March 5, 1997 by President Karen Noonan.

The February minutes were accepted as corrected.

The following reports were made;

Nominating Committee: Margit Spector reports that the committee has to finalize a few positions. The slate will be published in the May Newsletter.

Financial Report: Bunny Blackstone gave a verbal financial report. A printed statement will be presented at the next meeting.

Fund Raiser: Bunny Blackstone circulated the pens and reported that the umbrellas will be in soon. Both will be sold as fund raisers to our members, at our programs, and will be presented for sale at the State Convention.

Education Foundation: Ann Hicks

presented the Education Foundation report. A motion was made to approve the recommendation to contribute \$8500.00 to the Buffalo Branch Centennial American Fellowship Fund for 1996. A motion was made to accept the suggestions for the Named Gift recipients for 1996-1997 as long as they include Shamus O'Connor, Chuck Jamieson, and Molly Fleyscher. The motions passed unanimously. Hicks also circulated the AAUW Education Foundation Update. Hicks also stated that she had placed an ad in the State Convention Program. Some suggestions were made concerning Named Gift Recipients: we hold them to a few names making it more important, and we name a table at the Book Sale in a persons honor.

Strategic Planning: Diane Silvestro circulated names of members who have signed up for individual committees and lists of suggestions for those committees to consider. Silvestro has asked that these committees meet within the next three weeks. Silvestro asked the Board to approve the purchase of 2 tickets at \$25.00 each for the 3rd Annual Women's History Month Luncheon, sponsor by WAC and the Erie County Commission on the Status of Women, to be held on March 21,1997. The purchase of two tickets will allow us to have a table to use for informational purposes. The motion was made and approved.

New Business: Bunny Blackstone informed the Board on the progress of "Take Your Daughter to Work". It will probably take place in late spring or early fall.

AAUW Educational Foundation (EF)

Our Philanthropic Commitment

EF is the philanthropic arm of AAUW which supports AAUW's continued efforts in advancing education and equity for women and girls. As we know EF does this by providing funds for groundbreaking research, community action projects and pioneering scholarship by outstanding

women. This money comes primarily from the long-term? grassroots, fund-raising efforts of AAUW branches across the country. The enduring commitment of AAUW members to contribute to this 115 year-old program is remarkable. As a result EF has helped more than 6,500 women reach their personal and professional goals through a variety of fellowships and grants.

In 1996-97 the AAUW Educational Foundation awarded more than \$2.6 million in fellowships and grants to 308 women. This number represents only 9.8 per cent of the applicants. The number and quality of the applicants increases annually, particularly as costs for higher education mount and government funding dwindles.

Buffalo Branch

In 1972-73 Buffalo Branch made a commitment to establish a Research & Projects Endowment (\$35,000.00). It was later completed. In 1982-83 the Buffalo Branch Centennial American Fellowship Fund was created. As a branch we anticipate completing our pledge of \$100,000.00 with proceeds from this year's used book sale. With the approved contribution of \$8,500.00 from the 1996 book sale, the amount in the fellowship fund is now approximately \$95,000.00.

Action grant recipients for 1997-98. Working with nine other AAUW members from across the country, several of whom had been earlier recipients of EF career development grants or fellowships, was an unexpected opportunity and rewarding experience.

The process of selection actually began prior to the meeting in Washington, DC. Each panelist received a carton of 150 career development applications and a notebook of 17 community action applications. Along with the applications we received the criteria to be considered in the selection process and packets of reviewer evaluation forms. We were each assigned to read 75 career applications and rank order our top 17. Two weeks later we communicated by e-mail or telephone with our partner and shared our top ranked 17 applicants. We then read the applications selected by our partner, compared those to the applicants we had on our lists, and compiled an integrated rank order listing to review in Washington. Once in Washington, we reviewed, eliminated and finalized our preferred list of 12-15 applicants to present to the full panel. The community action grant recipients were reviewed and selected in the same fashion.

A frustration for reviewers and staff was not being able to

fund more of the outstanding and highly qualified candidates. Of 724 eligible applications (up significantly from previous years), we were able to select only 70 candidates and 3 alternates to be recommended to the EF Board for approval next month.

It was wonderfully inspiring to read and hear the stories of so many highly motivated and focused career applicants. The scope and significance of their accomplishments, contributions and future goals are awesome.

I was gratified to be invited to be a guest panelist (reviewer). Having this opportunity deepened my regard for membership and involvement in AAUW. As members we can be proud of the work of our branch in supporting the AAUW Educational Foundation which has such a grand tradition of providing "funds to advance education, research, and self development for women and to foster equity and positive societal change."

Be Part of the Women-Built House

Have you ever thought that 'we girls can do anything?' Now's the time for us to show others that we can even build a house!

NAWBO (National Association of Women Business Owners) has teamed up with Habitat for Humanity to build a women-built house in Buffalo. And AAUW Buffalo Branch has offered to support this worthy project. We are asking our members to get involved in the actual construction of this house, the 50th Habitat for Humanity/Buffalo house. In fact, the Board felt so confident that there would be sufficient interest in helping a family (in this case, a single mother and her two children) move into decent, safe housing that the Board committed our membership to volunteering 200 hours.

What does it mean to volunteer to work on this house? It means that no construction experience is required but that once the building starts, volunteers (15 max) will be working a five-hour day or until the materials for that day are used up. There is no way to know in advance what type of work you'll be doing. Although you may volunteer to work only one day, one day is a generous contribution of your time.

How can we volunteer time? As you may have read in Pat Swift's March 8th column, "Womanscope," four thousand volunteer hours are needed, and to date one thousand hours have been pledged. If you are interested in volunteering, contact Ann Bish or Ann Hicks at 741-3964 to request a form.

Can we make money donations? Definitely. Again, call 741-3964 and we'll give you the needed information to make your donation. NAWBO has raised \$32,000 but \$42,000 is needed to build the three-bedroom home. (Donations totaling \$370 with our 200 volunteer hours will secure AAUW Buffalo Branch's name on NAWBO's published donor list.)

When is the ground breaking for this women-built house at 589 Sycamore Street? Very likely construction will begin in May and the family will be in their new home by Christmas.

We are extremely enthusiastic about this venture with NAWBO as we believe that by getting involved Buffalo Branch is contributing its support, not only to a project of another women's organization, but also to the Buffalo community. Anyway, "we girls can do anything." Right?

In 1981 we began warehousing books at the YWCA on Franklin St., just a hop, skip and a jump from the Convention Center, where the sale was to be held in April, '82. 
