The Buffalo Branch Achievement Award has been presented annually to a

woman in the Western New York area since 1940. The award recognizes the various achievements and contributions of women in our community. Selection criteria focus on those activities and achievements which reflect personal and/or professional involvement and commitment to promoting equity for women, education and self-development over the life span, and positive societal change. The 1996 recipients, Betty J. Cappella and Geraldine E. Bard from Buffalo State, were recognized for their contributions in establishing Project F.L.I.G.H.T. (Family Literacy for Intergenerational Growth and Home Teaching).

BRIDGES FOR EDUCATION

Bridges for Education (BFE) was founded in 1994 to promote tolerance and understanding using English as a bridge. Since 1964, Bridges for Education has sponsored volunteers to teach conversational English in Eastern and Central Europe. In 1996, over 100 teachers taught almost 1000 teenagers and college students from Bulgaria, Lithuania, Poland, Slovakia and Ukraine, at 8 language camps. Are you interested in joining them this summer?

Teachers teach conversational English and American culture for three weeks in July at camp sites in the country or city. Teachers live in dormitories with the students and share meals together in a cafeteria. Accommodations are basic. Morning sessions are held in the class rooms and afternoons and evenings are

Used Book Sale, Continued from January

Although she had no interest in sports, Mollie Fleysher did make two forays onto the sports scene with me.

In 1982 the Buffalo Bisons were the farm team for the Pittsburg Pirates who were coming to Buffalo to play. Mollie accompanied me to an Aud Club luncheon where we planned to get baseballs autographed. We circulated among the players, and Mollie, with her sweet smile and charming manner, got the autographs, although I'm sure she didn't recognize any of the players. (I didn't recognize too many either.)

But we got our autographs, and picked up some memorial mugs for the sealed bid sale.

On another occasion we met with Bob Lanier at a senior center on Kensington Ave. to get an autographed basketball. I had met him earlier when he was still at St. Bonaventure, but was home with a broken leg. He signed several items for us at that time.

When I read that Jesse Owens, the Olympic star, would be in Buffalo in July of 1976, I arranged for Myra Menti and me to meet him at the Sheraton East. He agreed to have Arco, his sponsor, send us a large framed poster of his Berlin win for our sealed bid sale, which would be held the following April. A week before the sale opened, it still hadn't appeared. Finally, the morning the sale opened, it was delivered. It brought a bid of \$100, a substantial price in those days.

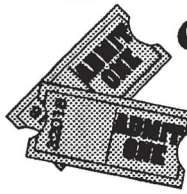

AAUW Educational Foundation: A Legacy of Advancement for Women

As we move into the second month of the new year, we need to reaffirm our long standing commitment to EF. Soon we will all be called upon to offer our support to help plan, organize and run our major EF fund raiser, the Annual Used Book Sale. Once again we are grateful to Bunny Blackstone who is serving as the chair for the 1997 sale. Watch for details in every newsletter. Volunteer. We will need your help. You can be specific about what you can and cannot do but plan to participate in some way and become better acquainted with other members of the Branch. As a Branch we have been able to contribute substantial sums to the Foundation. This has been as a result of the contributions of many members including remarkable leadership, outstanding cooperation and essential resources.

Although not fully funded yet, the Buffalo Branch Centennial Endowment is supporting one of the recipients of the Selected Professions Fellowships. Valerie Bradley is a UB School of Law student. Her plans include opening a law office in inner-city Rochester and one day becoming a family court judge. She was one of 166 applicants eligible; forty-four were awarded for 1996-97. We hope that she will attend one of our Branch meetings this year.

Another Buffalo Branch Endowment has been designated to support jointly a community action project. The Females,

Physics, and Outdoor Education project was developed by Mary Ellis and Cynthia Slotkin in Kent Elementary School in Carmel, NY. Through an outdoor education program, these elementary school girls will learn about potential and kinetic energy and simple machines such as gears, levers and pulleys. This was one of fifty-five grants (selected from 155 applications) to be awarded for 1996-97.

Girls in the Middle: Working to Succeed in School

This latest report from the Foundation offers a close-up look at how adolescent girls meet the challenges of middle school and provides a new understanding of ways schools can use various educational reforms to create an equitable environment for student achievement. Dr. John Hay has been a member of the Buffalo academic community since 1991. His delightful accent will immediately reveal his Scottish heritage. As a virologist, Dr. Hay has studied many viruses with perhaps most emphasis on the Herpes group of viruses and specifically Varicella Zoster virus, the cause of chicken pox and shingles. However, his more recent interests have been on the new viruses emerging in various parts of the world. If you've read The Hot Zone this is your chance to get the real truth about ebola as well as other viruses such as hanta that you may not have heard about.

Dr. Hay is the author of over 80 scientific publications spanning his work in Scotland and the United States and is an often invited speaker at scientific sessions all over the world.
