TEN WOMEN RECEIVE FINANCIAL AID FROM BRANCH'S FUNDS

Ten women ranging in age from 20 to 49 from seven different institutions of higher learning have been awarded loans and grants worth a total of \$17,100. There were nine loans totaling \$14,600, and three grants totaling \$2500. The Chamberlin Loan Fund provided \$16,100. Grants totaling \$1000 were given from the Funds for Education. The total amount allocated from our financial aid funds during the 1995-96 fiscal year was \$27,850 including \$3000 in grants. The Chamberlin Loan Fund provided \$26,350 and Funds for Education provided \$1500. A total of 16 women received assistance.


President's Report: Bunny Blackstone thanked all the Veteran board members for their service and welcomed the incoming new board members.

Membership Report: Rita Cascia will invite two new members to attend the board meeting each month.

Treasurer's Report: Michelle Bancroft circulated the Treasurer's Report showing a checking account balance of \$5916.17 and savings account balance of \$3115.79. The report was accepted and filed for audit.

Loan Fund Treasurer's Report: Maryalice Seagrave reported for Cindy Monacelli. The report included a balance of \$33,254.11 in the Chamberlin Loan Fund and \$7125.98 in Funds for Education. The report was accepted and filed for audit.

Education Foundation Report: Stacey Johnson circulated her report showing an overall balance of \$2515.59. The report was accepted and filed for audit.

Education and Equity Report: Karen Noonan reported for Judy Weidemann. Judy Weidemann represents the branch on the "Kids' Vote USA" and "Women's Voter Coalition" committees and will update the board on the activities planned for the November elections.

Community Report: On behalf of the Buffalo Branch, Phyllis Kelly delivered the children books remaining from the book sale to "Project F.L.I.G.H.T."

Chamberlin Loan Report: Maryalice Seagrave circulated copies of the 1995-96 Chamberlin Report which Stacey Johnson has presented at The MayLuncheon. Maryalice also presented the committee's recommendations for three candidates for Chamberlin Loans. It was moved and seconded to accept the committee recommendations. The motion passed unanimously.

Public Relations Report: Rita McDonald reported that two photographs and three articles on the

book sale appeared in the Buffalo News and local papers. Rita recommends the Book Sale Committee form a publicly subcommittee for next year's Book Sale.

May Luncheon: Bunny Blackstone thanked Linda Fusco and her committee for the successful May luncheon. Linda will present her report to the next chair.

Old Business: Bunny Blackstone reported that our Book Sale grossed over \$11,000 before expenses. Bunny thanked the committee and all branch members for their support.

Bunny Blackstone and Judy Weidemann will be setting up guidelines for the Michael Weidemann Scholarship.

Bunny reminded committee Chairs that their annual reports are due.
