



Legislative Advocacy Group (Public Policy)

What Is the "Dignity for All Students Act"?

The Dignity for All Students Act (A2634 - S1628)

- requires establishing teacher and administrative training guidelines on dealing with and responding to harassment and hate violence:
- ensures that diversity and human relations education is included in the curriculum so that there is a clear message to all that bullying and sexual harassment in the schools is unacceptable;
- provides a staff member trained in human relations education on-site.

This bill would apply to all public schools in New York State, grades K - 12, but it exempts private and religious schools. This bill also amends the New York Education Law to prohibit discrimination and harassment in schools based on real and perceived race, ethnicity, national origin, religion, sex, gender, sexual orientation or disability. Students should be able to concentrate on learning and personal growth in the schools and not have to cope with taunting and violence.

AAUW NYS supports DASA and encourages members to call or write their state legislators. urging support for this bill.

AAUW BUFFALO BRANCH TRAVEL GROUP ROCHESTER HOUSE & GARDEN TOUR AND HIGH FALLS DISTRICT SATURDAY, JUNE 1, 2002

Rochester House and Garden Tour: Join us for a stroll through the homes and gardens of 12 historic properties in the Browncroft neighborhood. This area is an outstanding early twentieth-century residential neighborhood that is in the process of being nominated for listing in the National Register of Historic Places. This subdivision was created out of former nursery grounds owned by the Brown Brothers Nursery. Colonial Revival and Tudor Revival house predominate the neighborhood of well-tended yards and public spaces. Guides will be located at each tour stop. Tour booklets will describe the history and architectural features of each site and contain a map of the tour area.

Following the tour we will visit the High Falls District of Rochester.

See the Genesee River rushing over a 96-foot cliff! Visit shops. Walk through Rochester's past, and future! Learn all about the famous people who lived in Rochester! Spend a relaxing afternoon in the park at Granite Mills Commons or on the 858-foot long Pont-de-Rennes bridge! Stand in Triphammer Forge and see actual 1816 factory ruins! Walk across historic footbridges and peek beneath the street at a replicated 240-foot section of the original raceway used to power mill wheels!
