This Summit is an opportunity for girls in grades six through twelve to discuss topics chosen by the girls themselves with the adults acting as facilitators. We hope to encourage their activities by providing the opportunity to learn how to join other girls from diverse cultures and backgrounds to create positive societal change in their communities.

As the largest source of funding in the world exclusively for graduate women, the AAUW Educational Foundation has helped approximately 7,300 women in 125 nations to pursue their professional goals through fellowships and grants. In 1999-2000, the Foundation awarded more than \$3 million to 271 women. Approximately onefourth of all fellowships and grants are awarded annually to women of color Locally, the AAUW Buffalo Branch book sale committee has been working year round to accumulate books of value for our book sale in June. Our members donate space in their homes and pick up books from libraries and homes in the area. Their ongoing efforts are appreciated by our branch members and the enthusiastic readers in our WNY community. Most of the unds raised from the Book Sale go to the Educational Foundation.

March 8 Celebration of Women's History Month Will Feature'a Program'on Portrayal of Women in Mass Media

American Association of University Women (Buffalo Branch) will host on March 8, 2002 International Women's Day, a dinner program at Samuel's Grande Manor on the theme "Portrayal of Women in Mass Media". Zonta International, Erie County Commission on the Status of Women and National Organization for Women (NY State) are cosponsors the event .

Four panelists, experts on various aspects of the media, will provide an overview of the theme and delve into selected topics:

Dr. Elayne Rapping - professor in the Women's Studies Department at University at Buffalo, a specialist in issues of media and gender and mainstream culture will speak about "Images of Women in Media in a Changing World."

Dr. Rafika Merini, associate professor in the Modern and Classical Languages Department. at Buffalo State College and past head of Women's Studies at the College, will speak on "Stereotypical Images of Women of French-speaking Africa and Middle East in International Media."

Faye Lone-Knapp, an author, poet, cultural presenter on issues of identity and Native American education and literature, will speak

on "Portrayal of Native-American Females in Mainstream Children's Literature"

Dr. Bernadette Wegenstein, visiting assistant professor in the Media Study Department at University at Buffalo, a linguist, semiotician and expert in Romance languages and cultures will speak about "Bellissima pasta - Femininity and Italianita in Pasta Advertisements".

The panelists will address the audience early during the event so as to encourage discussion about the theme at dinner tables. There will be also displays of examples of some advertisements (see page 3) to promote discussion and enhance guests' participation in the celebration.



Congressional Outlook For 2002: Issues to Watch

In 2001 Congress tried to limit access to reproductive health care, failed to pass an economic stimulus plan to help low-income workers, and attempted to enact private school vouchers and thereby weaken public schools. These threats will likely persist in 2002.

Reproductive Choice: Attempts will be made to continue to restrict a woman's right to choose, including limiting international family planning funding and reducing funds for domestic family planning. If Congress approves legislation attacking women's access to safe and comprehensive reproductive health services, President Bush is likely to sign it into law

Economic Stimulus: In 2001 Congress failed to pass an economic stimulus package to help low-income women workers, who make up the majority of workers in the industries hardest hit by the economic downturn. Partisan stalemates are likely to continue to prevent the enactment of an economic stimulus bill to respond to the weakened economy.

Education: Attempts will continue to be made to weaken public schools through the creation of federally supported education savings accounts and private and religious school vouchers. Further, public education will likely remain inadequately funded to meet the needs of low performing schools.



Specific actions have included protests against the conflicts and military aggression in the Middle East, the Gulf, the Balkans, Sudan, Afghanistan & Kosovo, plus demonstrations to end sanctions against Iraq.

Women in Black movement was nominated for the Nobel Peace Prize in June 2001 by eight Danish and Norwegian parliamentarians (four women and four men). Women in Black was awarded Millennium Peace Prize by UNIFEM

On 8 March 2001, International Women's Day, The United Nations Development Fund for Women (UNIFEM) and International Alert awarded the Millennium Peace Prize for Women to Women in Black (Israel and Serbia). The Peace Prize is a part of the Women Building Peace Campaign, a global effort to raise awareness of women's perspectives of peace and conflicts and support the active participation of women in all levels of peace building.
