BOOK SALE 2001

They said it couldn't be done—make more money with fewer books, BUT we did it! Yes indeed, we did have fewer books. However, our collection in the Collectibles Room was the largest and most profitable to date, thanks to a dedicated committee getting better at detecting books of value. Congratulations to the Buffalo Branch for raising \$21,272.95. Thanks to an "all-out effort" by our members, we were successful again. We need everyone's help, even if it is just in donating books, informing your friends and neighbors about the sale, or making phone calls. Each "spoke of the wheel" is necessary to make the wheel turn. This year there were 101 people working at the site for a total of 1846 hours (an increase from last year). The breakdown follows:

- 34 members worked 1-5 hours
- 17 members worked 5-10 hours
- 32 members worked 10-25 hours
- 9 members worked 25-50 hours
- 6 members worked 50-100 hours
- 3 members worked 100+ hours.

This does not include those members behind the scene making calls, typing labels, working on publicity, etc. Thank you one and all.

I can't say enough about our committee. They are very dedicated, hard working, and flexible (they have to be, little remains the same from one year to the next, except-luckily our site for the last three years). This year AmeriCorps informed us that their policy had changed and they were now charging for their services. Their fees were much too high to continue so we went with an alternative plan and rented a U-Haul to pick up the books from the depots. The committee came to the rescue with many husbands to help, and we also received some assistance from the "YES" program. 
