AAUW Buffalo Branch Co-Sponsors Martin Luther King Jr. Commemorative Event, Mae Jemison, Speaker

We are proud to co-sponsor this special event at UB s Center for the Arts (CFA) Main Stage, 8 pm on Thursday, February 27. Mae C. Jemison blasted into orbit aboard the space shuttle Endeavour, September 12, 1992, and became the first woman of color to go into space. Dr. Jemison was a National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) astronaut for six years. In a 1999 Presidential Ballot national straw poll conducted by The White House, Jemison was selected as one of the top seven women leaders. She was the keynote speaker at the AAUW. Convention in 2001, Houston, TX

Jemison founded The Jemison Group, Inc. to focus on the beneficial integration of science and technology into our everyday lives. She also created BioSentient, a medical technology company that develops and markets mobile equipment worn to monitor the body s vital signs and train people to respond favorably in stressful situations.

Dr. Jemison serves on the Board of Directors for Scholastic, Inc. and Valspar Corporation. In 2001, she was elected into the National Academy of Sciences Institute of Medicine; she has been inducted into the National Women s Hall of Fame and the National Medical Association Hall of Fame. Dr. Jemison is an A.D. White Professor-at-Large at Cornell University. She spent two and a half years (1983-1985) as Area Peace

Corps medical officer for Sierra Leone and Liberia in West Africa.

Born in Decatur, Alabama and raised in Chicago, she entered Stanford University at age 16 on a scholarship. She graduated with a Bachelor of Science degree in Chemical Engineering and fulfilled the requirements for an A.B. in African and Afro-American studies. She earned her doctorate in medicine at Cornell University Medical College. She has received a number of honorary doctorates including one from Princeton University.

AAUW Plans Women Count: Conversations about Equity Conference

Join the Women's Studies Interdisciplinary Unit of Buffalo State College, in celebrating March 8, International Women's Day with a conference, Women Count: Conversations about Equity. It will be held from 9:20 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. at Buffalo State College, Campbell Student Union, 1300 Elmwood Avenue in Buffalo.

The International Women s Day Conference will feature a documentary in which Marilyn Waring, former member of the New Zealand Parliament demystifies global economics for general audiences. With wit and humor, she points out that Gross Domestic Product does not take into ac-(continued on page 4)

count some costs and completely ignores the unpaid work of women. Keynote speaker will be Joanna Kerr, who will present international Strategies to value women and their work. she is the Executive Director of the Association for Women's Rights in Development (AWID), an international organization based in Toronto, Canada with thousands of members worldwide, connecting, informing and mobilizing people and organizations committed to achieving gender equality, sustainable development and women's human rights. Ms. Kerr has a rich background in policy research and advocacy related to the gender dimensions of economic reform, women's human rights, and women's employment issues. In addition, there will be group discussions and presentations by panelists including "How Courts Value Women's Household Services", "Pay Equity: Two Case Studies in How to Achieve It", "Why the Judge Ruled in This Plaintiff's Favor" and "The Challenge of Child Care Finance". There will also be time for questions and answers.

Public Policy

On January 27, 2003, members of the Buffalo Branch had the opportunity to hear an up date on the efforts of the Campaign for Fiscal Equity (CEF) for public schools in New York State. The meeting was organized by the League of Women Voters Buffalo/Niagara and co-sponsored by AAUW, Buffalo Branch.

Jessica Garcia, representative of CFE brought the audience up to date on the court case pending between CFE and the State of New York. CFE initiated a lawsuit against the State of New York, because of the inequality of amounts of money spent on school children in different part of the state. The case is now in the Appellate Division of the State Supreme Court.

A reading of the Buffalo News on almost any day gives us a sobering picture of the precarious financial position of the Buffalo Public Schools.

In 2002 and 2001 at the state AAUW Convention, the Buffalo Branch initiated resolutions calling for support of efforts toward fiscal equity for schools in New York State. These resolutions were passed. We must continue to focus on this effort and support efforts of groups like CFE.

The Public Policy Committee will keep you informed on further progress of the CFE case and suggest ways of supporting fiscal equity for our schools.
