

After hearing an extremely interesting book review with a personal touch, a proposal was made that a new column might be created in the newsletter. It was suggested that perhaps, those not able to attend any of the literary study groups, might be interested in some of the presentations and be encouraged to read the book reviewed.

The following is the first, in that is hoped to be a series of reviews.

Review To The Clueless Group

I began my review of *NO GRAVES AS YET* saying historians, scholars and fiction writers have taken a new approach to "one of the least understood and bloodiest wars in America history,." World War I Mystery writer Anne Perry gave life to her characters as they strive to solve four suspected murders and and a suicide in an English boarding school. She also wove into the plot, their thoughts and fears over England's possible entrance into the War. The year was 1914. Her title is somewhat cryptic in that the reader is left to conclude how it is related to the plot as a whole.

In April 2003 as a member of the international Great War Society, devoted to the study of World War I and its effects upon society, world wide, I traced my Father's tour of duty through France from 1918-1919. My guide and I drove along the now pastoral country side stopping at museums, monuments, trenches and battle fields. We walked through cemeteries where row upon rows of white marble crosses and markers with the Star of David cast shadows on meticulous green lawns.

In the Romagne Cemetery I laid a single red rose beneath the cross of a fallen member of the 78th., my Father's Division. In several places my emotions soared and often my vision blurred as the words stuck in my throat.

In her book, Ms. Perry combines her extraordinary story telling with historical events. I look forward to reading *SHOULDER THE SKY*, a sequel, reviewing it and showing more of my photos.

Do You Want to Join the New 2005 Scholarship Committee?

The Branch is seeking members for a new committee charged to create and implement the four new scholarship and award programs of the Buffalo Branch. Members of the committee may expect to spend approximately three hours per month in their duties. The reward for your three hours of time? Priceless....

The phenomenal success of the Book Sale allowed the Buffalo EF funding to reach new heights. One result is the creation of four new educational scholarships and grants which broaden the areas we influence and provide the highest level of local support. The approximate \$7,000 unused from 2003-2004 funds plus an additional \$15,500 from the 2004 Booksale have been allocated to create the four programs:

Buffalo Branch EF "Catalysts for Change" Scholarship Fund is a highly competitive program to recognize the efforts of one high school student, one college student, and one adult/non-traditional student. Three scholarships of \$5000 will be awarded.

Entrants will be asked to focus on how grassroots efforts by women have effected positive change for women and girls taking the Buffalo Branch Book Sale as an example.

In 1955, the Buffalo Branch held its first Book Sale-- a new fund-raiser in keeping with the organization's image. The first Book Sale had a lofty purpose: funds for scholarships. It was a success; that first sale raised \$209 during the one-day event. It would be forty years before the Booksale proceeds reached \$10,000.

Regardless of the amount, funds were always put to good use. These funds are the seeding for local scholarships, interest-free loans, support of visiting speakers, and various other educational programs and endeavors.

Fifty years later, monetary proceeds have multiplied 30,000 times-- drastically increasing the organization's ability to promote equity, gender awareness, and lifelong learning. Even more impressive is that the Booksale is still run totally on volunteer effort with approximately 130 members donating personal time of 1 to 1000 hours each!

With this background on the Branch, prospective recipients are asked to compose an essay on a past historical figure or current model who demonstrates how a woman or women have taken limited resources or a grassroots approach and realized success.

Educational Project Grants

Analogous to National EF Community Action Grants, this endeavor provides funding for women and organizations based on their support of EF principles: promotion of equity, gender awareness, and lifelong learning. Candidate individuals and organizations may submit proposal which will be reviewed by a committee. Recipients must provide a detail of outcomes following the program. Up to ten \$500 grants may be awarded.

Buffalo Branch EF Academic Awards for GirlsThis program seeks to reinforce the importance

of education to young girls. Although success during high school and college is often recognized, too many girls are lost during their early school years. The purpose of this proposal is two-fold. First, the program promotes the importance of education and lifelong learning for girls. Allocation of \$750 of funding allows for a flier to be provided to local schools targeted at grade levels and perhaps a coordinated effort of "talks" at local schools. Secondly, the program provides young girls with "starter" funding for their college education through five to ten awards --perhaps savings bonds-- at \$50 to \$100 each. The message of this program parallels our mission: There are rewards for good academics the completion of formal education is an important ultimate goal.

Buffalo Branch EF Emergency Fund

This program set aside a small amount of funds for one-time serious needs for educational funding. One important committee responsibility is to develop the criteria for funding as well as the guidelines for establishing a rotating committee to review and propose allocation. A total of \$500 of funding is provided for up to five awards that can be allocated on an as-needed basis. Funds not spent will be returned to general EF funds.

Time Commitment

The 2005 Scholarship Committee is responsible for working out details, proposing guidelines, developing timelines and returning the recommendations to the Board. Four subcommittees will be formed to focus on the programs. As we hope that all four programs will be operational in early 2005, committee members may expect 2 meetings in January

totaling about 6 hours of time commitment and 2 hours per month commitment February through June.
