## March 8 International Women's Day Celebration to Feature Report from Sri Lanka

Drs. Meredith Reid Sarkees and Nancy McGlen will be speakers for the International Women's Day Celebration and Dinner on March 8, 2005. They are co-authors of *Women and Foreign Policy: The Insiders*.

Dr. Sarkees is a Fellow with the Center for Women's Intercultural Leadership at St. Mary's College in Indiana. She is the author of two books including Women and Foreign Policy: The Insiders. She is also the author of numerous articles and book chapters on women in foreign policy, women and peace and the correlates of war. She has spent the last two years interviewing women foreign policy leaders in nations around the world. Dr. Sarkees has traveled to Sri Lanka three times in the last year including the month after the tsunami. We will hear a first hand report on the conditions in Sri Lanka after the tsunami.

Dr. Nancy E. McGlen is Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences at Niagara University. Dr. McGlen has written and spoken extensively on women in politics and the academic profession. She is the co-author of four books including, *Women, Politics and American Society*, 3rd ed. and *Women and Foreign Policy*: AAUW Buffalo Branch Newsletter - March 2005 *The Insiders.* In March 2002, she served as Chair for the first Niagara County Institute for Public Leadership, a YWCA program to train women for public leadership. Currently she serves on the Leadership Committee for the Niagara County Commission on the Status of Women and as a board member for the YWCA of Niagara County. She has been a speaker on women's issues for numerous clubs and organizations in the Buffalo/Niagara area.

### A Brunch Program About Buffalo's Historic Olmsted Park System

Among Buffalo's architectural treasures are six parks, seven circles and their connecting parkways masterfully designed by the world famous landscape architect, Frederick Law Olmsted, whose well known works include the Central Park in New York City and The Mall in Washington D.C. Olmsted's designs for Buffalo's Park System were exhibited at the 1876 Centennial Exposition in Philadelphia where they were described as showing "the best planned city as to its streets, public places and grounds in the United States, if not the world." Currently this park system is on the National Register of Historic Places. Its maintenance and revitalization are in the custody of Buffalo Olmsted Parks Conservancy in partnership with Erie County, the City of Buffalo, and the community.

On April 9th, at a brunch in the elegant Park

Lane Restaurant located at one of the circles designed by Olmsted, Deborah Ann Trimble, Executive Director of Buffalo Olmsted Park Conservancy will give an illustrated talk about Buffalo's historic Olmsted Park System. Ms. Trimble has an MA in Arts Administration from the University of Buffalo and a BA in Journalism from Buffalo State College. In 1999 she assumed leadership of the Conservancy and proceeded to forge new partnerships and cooperative agreements for managing and maintaining Buffalo's Olmsted Parks for enjoyment of the community and for preservation of this proud heritage.

Women comprise the majority of college students today, and students over the age of 40 are the fastest growing segment of the college population. However, many women, face significant barriers to their educational success, often having to balance job and family responsibilities against their academic work. To show women and girls how to overcome the barriers to their educational goals, the Buffalo Branch of the American Association of University Women, in collaboration with several local women's organizations, businesses and educational institutions, is sponsoring WNY's third annual TRANSITIONS CONFERENCE for Women Returning to School, on Friday, March 18, 2005 from 9:15 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. at Bryant & Stratton College, 40 Hazelwood Drive, Amherst, NY. Co-sponsors include the AAUW Buffalo Branch, Bryant & Stratton College, Erie Community College, Everywoman Opportunity Center and Partners in Business.

TRANSITIONS is a half-day program featuring 15 Workshops. Participants may choose to, attend whichever sessions they like. There is something for everything needed to succeed in college. The conference, which is aimed at students either returning to college or those entering for the first time (any age welcome) costs \$10, which includes materials for all sessions, refreshments and lunch. Fee waivers are available. Workshop sessions include such topics as "I'm Not 22 Anymore" (the obstacles that older students face in going to college and how to cope with them), "Wonder Woman Doesn't Live Here Anymore", (balancing family, work and school), "Succeeding on Campus" (includes the resources and aides available for success), "TAP, PELL and Beyond" (information on financial aid) and "Money Doesn't Grow on Trees" (paying for college and life's expenses). These will be offered beginning at 8:45 a.m. The MBTI is a tool for helping to understand strengths and for aiding in making decisions about career choices, relationships and personal goals.
