
Highlights from the March, 2005 Board Meeting:

- <u>Book Sale</u>: Cathy Weiss informed us that a site has been selected for this year's book sale. It is the same site as last year which is on Sheridan Drive in the Hill's/Ames Plaza. The sale is scheduled for June 1-5. It is expected that the committee will have access to the site by April 5th. A request was made for additional committee members. The PR chairman, Sue Grossman resigned, a replacement is needed. Cathy also thanked Theckla Mullen, Leona Barback and Ingrid Wetherbee for their assistance at the book sale at the VA Hospital. Thus far, there has already been \$10,000 worth of sales.
- <u>Chamberlin Loans Update</u>: Sandra Williams Bush told us that four candidates have been interviewed. There is a total of \$9,500 requested applicant need. The committee is requesting \$7,500 from the Branch. Report was accepted by the Board.

- <u>Title IX</u>: Cathy Weiss notified us that money is being returned to the contributors to the Title IX conference. \$500 of the total \$1,000 is being returned to D'Youville College. Cathy Weiss moved to return the money and Stacey Johnson seconded the motion and it was approved. In addition \$100 will be returned to NOW and \$1,000 to the Wendt Foundation. Expenses totaled approximately \$2,000 with the Branch losing \$1,476.
- Scholarship Committee: Tamara Brown told us the four scholarship committees are well underway. Each committee provided an update. Emergency Fund Summary: developed criteria and a rotating committee to handle emergency requests of short term and immediate need. Awards can be up to \$500. No application is required. The request will be reviewed by a committee of 3-4 people which will act within 3 days. This fund will not be promoted, other than through the AAUW newsletter. . Catalyst for Change Award: committee members include: Stacey Johnson, Betty Kist, Elaine Cusker and Elizabeth Bailey. This scholarship award can be up to \$5,000. There are three applicant categories for a high school senior, a matriculated student and a non-traditional student. The application deadline will be April 22nd. Stacey Johnson made a motion to move forward and Theckla Mullen was the second. Motion passed. The Grants Program committee headed by Joan Trinchera recommended that the number of grants awarded be revised from 10 awards to 5-7 of up to \$1,000. Draft guidelines were presented and the application will be available by the next Board Meeting. It is expected that they will be distributed in April and returned by July with
