



Tech Savvy Report

A special thank you to co-chair Betty Krist, other members of the planning committee, and the volunteers who gave their day to tap in to the technological talent that exists in our community.

We worked with many groups over the past 6 months to make sure that all girls everywhere in Western New York were invited. On Saturday, about 80 AAUW and non-member volunteers were rewarded with the opportunity to host approximately 202 girls and 88 parents, teachers, counselors, and other adults. The girls participated in 20 workshops where they chased after an otter, made raspberry lip balm and chocolate raspberry suppositories, performed probability experiments while making jewelry and other fun activities to illuminate the use of math and science in everyday life.

This shows us one more reason why the Book Sale is so important: Onethird of the funding for Tech Savvy was made possible by our local educational foundation. It was an absolute blessing to have two sponsors for this event-representing the industry and university alliances that are necessary if we are to achieve true equity. Our major sponsor the Praxair Foundation provided \$10,000 for Tech Savvy. Additionally, the School of Engineering and Applied Science provided \$500 toward the pre-Tech Savvy reception.

We have already heard from UB's Engineering School, the Girl Scouts, the Buffalo Science Teachers Network, the Lackawanna Schools, and others about their inclusion in Tech Savvy 2007! Again, thanks. You have made girls in Western New York tech savvy.

Educational Foundation Grants Announcement

If you or a woman you know needs funding for furthering their educational goals you might let them know that, applications for the 2007 to 2008 academic year will be available on August 1, 2006. We help support these so we hope Western New Yorkers will take advantage of them. Please refer to each program for application details, eligibility requirements, and deadlines. Here is a general out line of the grants to be awarded as detailed on the AAUW National Educational Foundation Web Site.

* American Fellowships support women doctoral candidates completing dissertations and scholars seeking funds for postdoctoral research leave or for preparing completed research for publication. Applicants must be U.S citizens or permanent residents. Oneyear postdoctoral research leave fellowships, dissertation fellowships, and summer/shortterm research publication grants are offered.

* Career Development Grants support women who hold a bachelor's degree and who are preparing to advance their careers, change careers, or re-enter the work force. Applicants must be U.S citizens or permanent residents.

* Community Action Grants provide seed money to individual women, AAUW branches and AAUW state organizations, as well as local community-based nonprofit organizations for innovative programs or nondegree research projects that promote education and equity for women and girls. Applicants must be U.S citizens or permanent residents.

May 2006

* International Fellowships are awarded for full-time graduate or postgraduate study or research to women who are not U.S. citizens or permanent residents. Supplemental grants support communitybased projects in the fellow's home country.

* Selected Professions Fellowships are awarded to women who are U.S. citizens or permanent residents and who intend to pursue a full-time course of study (during the fellowship year) in designated degree programs where women's participation traditionally has been low.

* University Scholar-in-Residence, located at a college or university, undertakes and disseminates research on gender and equity for women and girls.


