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



them over the objections and veto of the Governor. If approved by the voters this November, this constitutional amendment will allow the legislature more time to review the executive's proposed budget; create a "contingency budget" (essentially the previous year's budget) that automatically kicks in when there is no agreement on a budget at the beginning of the state's fiscal year; and creates a fiscal stabilization fund to boost the amount of funds held in reserve to help pay for school aid.

In addition, if the amendment is approved, the following budget reform legislation will automatically go into effect:

- An Independent Budget Office, with leadership chosen jointly by the legislative leaders, would provide independent fiscal analyses and certify that a contingency budget is balanced. If not, automatic across-the-board reductions (with some exceptions) are put in place.

- The legislature would be allowed to amend the contingency budget subject to the governor's line item veto.

- A two year appropriation for public education would be required.

- Greater budgeting reporting by the executive would be mandated.

- Health Care Reform Act Fund would be placed within the budget.

- The State's fiscal year would begin May 1, not April 1.

This constitutional amendment and auxiliary legislation is supported by NYS/AAUW, Common Cause, the League of Women Voters, and the New York Public Interest Research Group. It would bring New York in line with procedures in most of the other states.

This trafficking in persons (TIP) protocol is a component of the worldwide effort to combat modern-day slavery. It seeks to prevent trafficking, protect victims, and promote antitrafficking cooperation among nations.

After the protocol has been signed by President Bush, it must be counter-signed by Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice before being deposited at the United Nations.

November Ballot: New York State Constitutional Amendment

Off the books budgeting, of which the Health Care Reform Act is the largest, mask the true level of state authorized and imposed receipts and spending, resulting in a loss of accountability to policymakers and taxpayers. Also, there is currently no failsafe in place in the event that the two branches of the legislature and the governor cannot agree on a new budget in a timely manner. When New York State's budget is not passed on time, school districts and local governments must guess at how much aid they will receive and borrow money in the meantime.

After twenty years of late budgets, this year the Republican-controlled State Senate and the Democratic-controlled State Assembly agreed to a package of budget reforms and passed

Please Contribute to the Legal Advocacy Fund

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The AAUW Legal Advocacy Fund (a program of the AAUW Educational Foundation) is supporting *Doe v. Berry College*, a case in which a student at Berry College is suing the school in violation of Title IX of the Educational Amendments of 1972. The law states that when put on notice of sex harassment and assault, schools have a legal responsibility to remedy the situation.

The attorney representing the plaintiff stated, "This case at a small college in Georgia is indicative of the problem of sexual harassment and assault on college campuses across the country. Holding Berry College accountable under the law will demonstrate that Georgia is serious about equal educational opportunities for all."

Doe alleges that a male student of the college sexually assaulted her in the fall of 2001. After following the instructions of campus police and reporting the incident as directed in the school's policy on harassment and assault, Doe claims that nothing was done by Berry College to remedy the situation. Doe returned from studying abroad in 2004, and reported that the male student then attacked, tortured, and raped her.

Students have a right to pursue their education without fear of sexual harassment and assault. We hope that Berry College will rise to the challenge of the law and begin to create a harassment-free campus. <u>You can help LAF</u> and solve some Holiday shopping problems at the same time. 

Support a Study Group

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Muse and Minerva

Mary Wollstonecraft (1759-1797) and Phillis Wheatley (c 1753-1784) lived and wrote during the historical era of transition that became known as the Age of Enlightenment (1500-1800). New technology and improved methods of research led to an explosion of knowledge. Philosophers applied scientific principles to the study of government and society. They thought that people should use reason to free themselves from ignorance and superstition and such enlightened people could perfect themselves and society.

Okay – I can't escape my training as an Historian – Perspective + Context = Understanding

Phillis Wheatley's African name is unknown. She probably came from the area known as Senegal or Gambia at about the age of seven, when she was purchased directly off a slave ship in Boston by a wealthy tailor, John Wheatley, in 1761. She became the personal servant of Mrs. Susannah Wheatley and because of her precocity was treated well, by the standards of the time. She learned English quickly, studied Latin, as well as the *Bible* and English poetry. In 1773, she was sent to England with the Wheatley's sons and there her only book, Poems on Various Subjects, Religious & Moral, was published. She returned to Boston and was freed upon the death of the Wheatleys.

An excerpt from a poem to William Earl of Dartmouth, (appointed secretary in charge of the American Colonies in 1772) reveals her feelings on human freedom: Should you, my lord, while you peruse my song,
Wonder from whence my love of Freedom sprung,
Whence flow these wishes for the common good,
By feeling hearts alone best understood, I, young in life, by seeming cruel fate,
Was snatched from Afric's fancied happy seat:
What pangs excruciating must molest,
What sorrows labour in my parents' breast?
Steeled was that soul and by no misery moved
That from a father seized his babe beloved:
Such, such my case. And can I then but pray
Others may never feel tyrannic sway?

• • •

"It is time to effect a revolution in female manners – time to restore to them their lost dignity – make them, as part of the human species, labour by reforming themselves to reform the world". This quote should inspire one to read about the life of Mary Wollstonecraft and read her most famous book, *A Vindication of the Rights of Woman* (1792). (Or at least excerpts from same, the Introduction and Chapter II)

Mary was an independent woman who left home at the age of 19. She was self-taught and throughout her life helped women in abusive and tyrannical familial situations. She earned a living writing essays for review associated with the revolutionary movements in France and America.

Considering her outrage for the wrongs inflicted upon women, her writing is witty, and enjoyable to read.
