2007 Florida Legislature passed the legislation that will replace touch-screen voting machines with optical scan machines statewide for Election Day voting and early voting sites. Sadly, in NY State the DREs are still being pushed - e.g. uncertified DREs from Liberty Election Systems and their Dutch partner Nedap are to be used in Troy NY in the upcoming May 15, 2007 School District Election

Diversity Report

We invite all members and their friends to join us for the June AAUW Buffalo's ¡Adelante! G,L,B,T (Gay / Lesbian / Transgender / Bisexual) Awareness Month Book/Discussion Group at 6:00p.m. on Wednesday, June 13th at Talking Leaves, 3158 Main St. Buffalo, NY 14214. Join Ketie Jones as our Facilitator discussing *Blood Sisters: A Novel of an Epic Friendship* (Paperback - Publisher: Harrington Park Press). This recently published book by Mary Jacobsen, psychotherapist and consultant in private prac-

tice deals with the story of two women. Emily Ashmont is blunt, cynical, fiercely committed to her work, and straight. Val Summers is romantic, sweet, immensely idealistic, lesbian, and in love with Emily. The book tells the tale of these two unforgettable women and their decades-long friend-

ship that deepens into an epic story all its own. Told through personal letters that reveal each woman's innermost thoughts and desires, the novel chronicles their intimate friendship from the 1970s through the 1990s. It spans the years illustrating the trials and tribulations of lifelong friends as they search for life's meaning, meeting problems head-on while showing the depth and courage of their hearts as well as the uniqueness of their relationship.

Look for our July 11th book: *Smoke and Ashes: The Story of the Holocaust* by Barbara Rogasky, Holiday House, (Revised Edition) 2002. Location and Facilitator T.B.A. Rogasky presents information about the causes, ghettos, concentration and death camps, non-Jewish victims, resistance, "rescuers," the fate of the most notorious of the Nazis, and anti-Semitism and hate groups today. It includes facts unavailable at the time of the initial printing, such as sections on the regular German army's involvement in the atroci-

ties, and the treatment of homosexuals. The final chapter includes new sections on hate-group use of the Internet and Holocaust denial.

Wednesday, August 8 at 6:00 p.m. at the Frank J, Merriweather Public Library, Jefferson St. and Utica St. we will look into *Through My Eyes* by Ruby Bridges, Scholastic Press, 1999: Suitable for youths and adults. Surrounded by federal marshals, 6-year-old Ruby Bridges became the first black student ever at the all-white William Frantz Public School in New Orleans, Louisiana, on November 14, 1960. Perhaps

never had so much hatred been directed at so perfect a symbol of innocence-which makes it all the more remarkable that her memoir, simple in language and rich in history and sepia-toned photographs, is informed mainly by a sort of bewildered compassion. A personal, deeply moving historical documentary about a staggeringly courageous little

girl at the center of events that already seem unbelievable.

We look forward to a full summer of relaxing, vacations, and time for even more reading. If you would like to be on the Diversity Planning Committee for 2007-08, please contact me early in the summer. We thank all of you who have taken the time to attend our book discussions, our February Black History Month events and the repeated viewing of *Treemonisha* on National Library Day.

The AAUW Buffalo Branch, Inc. announces its 2007 grants program for the Buffalo Niagara Region in the categories shown below. The goal of the grants program is the promotion of equity, gender awareness and lifelong learning for women and girls. Six to eight grants of up to \$1,500.00 each will be awarded. Previous awardees may reapply but the new submission must be for a different project than previously awarded.

Individual Projects

By female college students pertaining to women's issues i.e.: research, thesis, dissertation, and independent study

Community Organizations and/or Neighborhood Enrichment Programs through not for profits, neighborhood groups and established organizations targeting girls and women in urban settings or public housing projects neighborhoods.

High School Leadership

Projects involving female students and their student counselors. Multi-school projects are encouraged.

Catalyst for Change Winners

At our May 5th annual luncheon we were pleased to present three young women with Catalyst for Change Scholarships. These scholarships are given in recognition of grass roots activism on the behalf of equity for women and girls.

Natalie Edbauer, Senior at Williamsville East High School, will attend University of Pittsburgh in the Fall. Her long term professional goal is to be a pharmacist. Her grass roots activities were with the Girl Scouts, culminating in receiving the Girl Scout Gold Award.

Natalie's community service project set up a resource room in the Erie Country Social Services Building to help provide basic necessities for foster children. A Badge Day for younger girl scouts was held that "informed them about foster care and being a good friend to foster children." The Project "demonstrates the philosophy of AAUW because it was helping to promote equality among women and girls whether they are from foster families or not."

Amanda Maggiotto, another winner, is a Junior at John Carroll University, in Cleveland Ohio. Her major is psychology. She plans to pursue a PhD in clinical or counseling psychology after graduating from John Carroll University. Amanda plans to work with families, women, and children.

At John Carroll University she served on many committees, supported the ban on date auctions and was involved in other grass roots activities for women on campus. She attended three student leadership conferences, two of which were sponsored by AAUW. She is working with an administrator to bring an all female sexual assault peer education group to campus.

Michele Bellino is a PhD candidate in Anthropology at the University at Buffalo and a Presidential Fellow. She plans to work toward motivating US education's curriculum to activate students' consciousness so that they will be inspired to take roles as social activists in their lives."

Her advisor wrote "She is a social activist...who will easily finish her PhD on time and also continue in her social activism for the rights of women." Her work is in Quetzealtenango Guatemala, doing research on young Mayan women's activism and leadership. Michele organized a major event on "Feminicide" in Guatemala, inviting the father of a young woman killed senselessly in Guatemala, translating while he spoke to a group of more than 70 students, faculty and staff at UB.

It was a pleasure meeting these young women and their guests, and hearing them talk about their plans for the future. We wish them much success.

You may also purchase a T-shirt or apron at the site.

The tables we need to rent are the biggest expense of the sale. We spent over \$3300 this year. Help will also be needed Monday morning, June 4, to clean out the room. Our lease expires the day after the sale each year.
