# **Education and Equity**

The Education and Equity Committee heard from Lee Tetkowski of the League of Women Voters about the League's Charter School monitoring, and final State consensus to continue this activity. Those attending learned that \$50 million from the Buffalo School budget goes to Charter schools each year. There are 13 Charter schools in Buffalo, and several outside the city. There is no tuition charged to students to attend charter schools. The per student costs are sent to the charter school by the home district of each student - the amount depends on what the per student costs are for that district. Students may attend charter schools outside of the district. Transportation may or may not be a problem.

# HOW TO PREVENT IDENTITY THEFT Buffalo Branch Program, April 8, 2008

"Few crimes have made people more anxious more quickly as the sudden onslaught of identity theft. It's in the newspapers every day and on the news every night. People are worried that someone's going to run up charges on their credit cards or fleece their bank accounts while their backs are turned. And there's some reason to worry: All a thief has to do is steal something as basic as a Social Security number to become a real public enemy. And while these crimes are relatively easy to commit, investigating and prosecuting them are complex and time-consuming matters. So it's up to all of us to be identity-smart and make sure we keep this crime from spreading. It's up to all of us to prevent identity theft." *Al Lenhardt, president and CEO, National Crime Prevention Council* 

Kim M. Baglio, Senior Special Agent, United States Secret Service coordinates the Identity Theft Task Force with the US Attorney's Office in the Western District of NY. She is a long-standing member of the International Association of Financial Crimes Investigators and is the current President of the WNY Chapter. Ms. Baglio conducts numerous public education trainings throughout the year to various community groups and to area banks, credit unions and casinos regarding Identity Fraud/Theft and Genuine/Counterfeit Currency.
