President's Message

Just before Thanksgiving I found a few hours to volunteer at the book-sale, storage and sorting site on Kensington Avenue. This endless task of sorting books reminded me of my college days, when at the end of the year, when I should have been preparing for exams, I spent countless hours crafting tissue paper flowers for the Moving-up Day parade float. However, our endeavor has a loftier goal, raising money to award scholarships to women to help them to complete their education. Reports of tuition rates shock and frighten me. Including inflation, there are many reasons for this crisis and no matter where we place the blame, the reality is that tuitions have risen 400% in the past twenty years. As conscientious citizens we of course should contact our government representatives and find ways to inform ourselves of how we may express our outrage.

Research compiled by the AAUW Public Policy and government relations show the following developments.

- Nearly 73% of undergraduates were considered "non-traditional" meaning they are older, they may work, or attend school part-time.
- The purchasing power of the Pell Grants (Federal needs-based grants) has declined substantially. Today, the maximum Pell grant covers only 33% of the total cost at a public four-year institution.
- Loan repayment is more burdensome for women, who earn less on average over the course of their

lives than their male counterparts.

This is why our scholarship initiatives are so important. We need to be creative in awarding them so the monies will be of true assistance. For example, if the colleges subtract the award from the guaranteed government grants, the scholarship is a zero-sum advantage. Students need financial assistance to cover the huge cost of books, travel and living expenses or even day-care costs. In the end, in whatever form our scholarships are awarded, they are important for encouraging the student and recognizing their achievements.

So, I ask members to find some hours in your week or month, to volunteer At the Book site. Cathy Weiss and Judy Weidemann are pleased with the response when the last call for help was made. From now until May, there's plenty more to do, so do not hesitate ------VOLUNTEER!



The committee's New Year's wish is that 2009 will see the best book sale ever. You can do it.



Buffalo EF Dollars at Work!

Members of the Poughkeepsie Branch have been working over the past 2 years to increase our visibility, coordinate our community activities, and bring in outside funding to support local projects. We are in the process of incorporating our branch and applying for taxexempt status so that we're eligible for more funding opportunities. We were also fortunate to receive a \$7,000 Community Action Grant this year from the Educational Foundation. (Ed. Note - this is a Buffalo-sponsored grant!) Our equity projects come under our "Equity for Life" umbrella, since they support all ages from newborn to adult. For the first half of the year, the AAUW grant is supporting our:

Multicultural conference –covering printing and postage costs

Girls' Conference for 7th grade girls – providing a bus for inner city girls, paying for food and beverages, and funding a highway billboard

Leading to Reading – purchasing books for our joint project with the United Way of Dutchess County. The "Born Learning" program supports a parent educator who gives books, along with health and developmental materials, to new mothers

The other half of the AAUW grant will pay for reunions for girls who have attended our girls' conferences. Reunion funding will include the fees of a math specialist to give a math emphasis to one of the reunions. It will allow us to expand our early literacy project to more centers throughout the county. In addition, we will again address pay equity with college women using the \$tart \$mart Workshops created by the WAGE Project.

We're very excited about our programs and are looking forward to a positive year!

On the International Scene with Lillis

The women of the Mothers Clubs of Tanzania sang, danced, and laughed at the gathering celebrating Barbara Grove and Kathy Mang Haag returning to the program in microloans which they created for remote villages near Kilamanjaro. The women in these villages use their loans to raise fowl, grow vegetables, set up small stores or even a restaurant in a setting near a sugarcane factory. These are very modest efforts but the empowerment of the women was evident from the moment they greeted us as a group to the visits to the individual villages.



Kathy and Barbara bring twenty years of experience in providing microloans to women in third world countries. I went to Tanzania as their guest (Kathy has been a neighbor in Kenmore) after a forty year absence from a country where I had been a Peace Corps volunteer. The program involving 300 women benefits from an excellent incountry coordinator, Hellen Mnakapi, who works with the cluster leaders and the deep affection and respect between the women and Barb and Kathy. This was a three week celebration. Cathy and Barbara love these women, share their successes and some losses and these feelings are reciprocated.

As the program in now about three years old in this area, it moves to a new phase. Some women will begin to



obtain loans and save at a commercial bank in an arrangement Barbara, an economic development person, and Hellen made locally to bring the services to the women. Barbara is instructing the women in creating business plans so they can expand their efforts. For those at a different level like two Masai villages, the microloans will be used to create chicken coops, feeder stations, and feed after the women take a course at the local agricultural college on how to raise chickens. Lacking experience with the market economy, the women will repay their loans in chickens. This program will also ensure that benefits will

go to the women, not their husbands, who famously raise cattle and goats.

The Libons, tribal village leaders, participated in the discussions and support the sponsors of the mothers clubs. So do local government leaders, including the regional director of the area who asked Kathy why she had not been invited to the loan day ceremony. She certainly will be next year!

LAF Strategy Update

AAUW will expand our LAF case support beyond the academic sphere to the wider workplace in line with our Value Promise to break down educational and economic barriers so that all women will have a fair chance.

As AAUW expands our LAF vision to include protecting the rights of all women, LAF will focus our direct case support strategically, seeking plaintiffs to support whose cases address significant issues that will clearly impact our fight for pay equity and workplaces free of sex discrimination.

AAUW will also continue and expand our long-term support as amicus curiae in gender discrimination and other civil rights cases.

AAUW will work closely with other respected organizations that are active in the gender equity arena to identify key cases with significant issues that align with our mission and would benefit by our expertise and credibility.

AAUW will look to organizational partners, collaborators, and members to help us target cases in which

AAUW's voice will make a difference. We are already getting some strong case recommendations.

AAUW has been in the fight to combat sex discrimination from the first, but with the U.S. Supreme Court narrowing our rights and pushing hard to rescind the gains we've made, we really are going to have to fight to defend that legacy. Strategic litigation will be a critical weapon for us over the next few years.

This will be a shift for LAF, which has focused more on deserving individuals than on landmark cases with precedent-setting potential. This new approach will offers the chance to make a difference for all women. AAUW has always had a powerful voice in the gender discrimination arena, and we need to use it to reinforce cases that will hold our ground and lead us forward.
