## **Did you Know?**

The Buffalo Branch has chosen over the years to set up two separate endowments as part of the AAUW Educational Foundation, helping women achieve their dreams and improving the opportunities for all women.

The current recipients of a Community Action Grant from one of these endowments are Betty Harrel (a past AAUW-NYS president) and Irene Keyes of the Poughkeepsie, NY Branch. Their branch project creates a continuum of programs called *Equity for Life*, which sows the seeds of equity for girls in early childhood and continues to empower them through adulthood. Programs provide information and literacy support for new mothers, books for preschoolers, math and science activities for school-aged children, mentoring for middle-school girls, and equity resources for college women.

The other endowment is currently funding post-doctoral research by Linzy Brekke-Aloise, at Stonehill College, in Massachusetts. *Fashioning America: Dress and Citizenship in the Early Republic* is the name of the project. Her research focuses on the intersection of politics and material culture, specifically, the ways in which objects were used to forge gender, racial, and political identities and communities in early national America. Her scholarship also explores the way fashion was organized and promulgated as a science. She is working to turn her dissertation into a book.
