AAUW's April dinner program will include a very special discussion presentation on fabulous first ladies, including the activist role first ladies have taken. This special program will be held at the historic Twentieth Century Club whose membership is also celebrating a very special anniversary this year. Board Activity Highlights: October through December

During the last quarter, the board empowered the Governance committee to look into possibility of looking into combining the two entities into a 501(c)(3) organization. This is strong possibility as only a small percentage of our funds are used for lobbying. Currently the branch is 501(c)(4) and the Educational Foundation side is 501(c)(3). They already have some feed back as to what this would entail and will be pursuing the best options.

In addition the board has approved a new treasurer Joan Eschner and approved as President Elect Stacey Johnson.

The board approved \$16,000 to be given to the American Fellowship and also ap-

proved that including this we would pledge \$200,000 over the next 15 years so that we would have our own named fund. Currently the Board is soliciting a name for this fund that would attract others to donate to it.

Tech Savvy, to be held March 13th, is well on its way. The speakers have been selected. Funding has been identified. The Key Note speaker is Heather Rozzi, MD a forensic scientist and the speaker for the adult portion is Lilly Ledbetter.

A study group called Writing Workshop is approved. Its first meeting will be January 28, 2010.

February Program Tours: COE

The New York State Center of Excellence in Bioinformatics & Life Sciences (COE) was created in Buffalo in 2002 as part of more than \$200 million dollars in investment from state, federal, industry and philanthropic sources to create a hub of life sciences expertise and innovation in Upstate New York. The COE brings a strong foundation in life sciences research and discovery to its mission and collaborative efforts with industry, government and researchers around the world to improve the health and well being of the population. The University at Buffalo is the lead academic organization with Roswell Park Cancer Institute and Hauptman-Woodward Medical Research Institute as research partners.

On Saturday, February 20th we'll have an opportunity to see the COE for ourselves. Starting at 9 AM with a continental breakfast catered by Au Bon Pain, we'll be intro-

duced by Director of Operations, Dr. Karen Utz, to many of the unique and exciting activities at COE. Then we'll divide into 3 groups and rotate through tours of the COE, a video at the Hauptman-Woodward Institute, and demonstrations at the supercomputer visualization center. All these facilities are within short walking distances and entirely accessible indoors. Our tour will finish by noon.

Parking is convenient to the 701 Ellicott Street entrance where you can pick-up your nametag and be directed to breakfast. We'll have coffee, tea, juice, pastry, muffins, bagels, fresh fruit, and condiments. The cost is \$11.50 including tax and gratuity. Please send your reservation to Betty Krist by February 10. Lilly Ledbetter and Heather Rozzi to Join Us in March for Tech Savvy's Fifth Anniversary!

Whether you plan to come at the beginning, the end or sometime in the middle, Tech Savvy, is sure to enlighten you. This is the fifth anniversary of our branch's program to inspire middle school girls to pursue STEM careers (science, technology, engineering, and math). Planning is underway to welcome 750 girls, parents, and teachers on Saturday, March 13.

Lilly Ledbetter (of Ledbetter v. Goodyear and the Lilly Ledbetter Fair Pay Act) is returning to Buffalo for a special session. The program will end with a keynote address by Dr. Heather Rozzi, a critical care physician specializing in forensic medicine. Dr. Rozzi is well regarded in the field of sexual assault evidence collection. Her attention to detail and interesting specialization in forensics is sure to pique the interest of young CSI fans!

Between the morning and afternoon sessions, the program will offer demonstrations and activities planned by the branch committee and supported by our educational fund and sponsors, which include Praxair and UB's School of Engineering.

More details will follow. Please consider volunteering before the event with mailings or stuffing tote bags, or the day of the event for a morning or afternoon shift.

There is also a pre-Tech Savvy reception on Friday evening, so mark your calendars for March 12th and plan to attend on Saturday, March 13th to hear Ms. Ledbetter and Dr. Rozzi.
