Women's life paths is the subject of a recent



study completed by the University of Buffalo's Regional Institute. In the following weeks, Brigid Doherty, Executive Director of the WNY Women's

Fund, will present the findings of the study, a comprehensive assessment of the status of women and girls in the Buffalo Region, to various agencies and volunteers concerned with women's issues. At a recent conversational meeting, I learned that the study focuses on key areas where changes can make a huge difference in women's lives. According to Doherty, "these changes can be as large and expensive as establishing and funding new programs, or as subtle as altering cultural attitudes". The "Pathways" report also included suggestions on how to improve the status of women and girls.

At this meeting I was pleased to speak about the ongoing work of the Buffalo Branch AAUW, including projects that address the needs of women and girls, particularly as they relate to education. Our members have volunteered many hours to accomplish so much.

- \$75,000.00 awarded in scholarships.
- The Sister-to-Sister program for middle school girls
- Tech Savvy a day long program about science and mathematics for middle school girls
- Educational Grants and interest free loans
- Grass Roots Grants for various community groups that work with women and young girls
- Programs that have enlightened us about women's issues including the status of veterans

Members have responded well to requests for



UPDATES: Education Loans and Grants


A total of \$11,500 will be distributed to four students who applied for Chamberlin Fund/Funds for education loans and grants

on Dec. 1, 2009. Chamberlin loans of \$2,000 and Chamberlin grants of \$9,500 were approved by the Board at its Feb. 3 meeting. The Chamberlin Fund has in excess of \$90,000 available for loans and grants and the FFE account, which was



June 1, 2010, is the deadline for the next round of applications and we urge members to inform their children, students, colleagues, friends and neighbors of this opportunity. Qualified students may receive up to \$3,000 in interest-free loans and/or grants in each of fours years in their academic career.

HISTORY REPEATS?

In 1881, Marion Talbot (with the support of her mother) and 16 other women established the Association of Collegiate Alumnae (ACA), the forerunner of AAUW. In the book, The History of the American Association of University Women 1881-1931, written by Marion Talbot and Lois Rosenbery, it says, "the Association of Collegiate Alumnae (ACA) was established with Talbot as secretary. Article II of its constitution states: The object of this Association shall be to unite alumnae of different institutions for practical education work. This was the first association of college and university trained women in the world.

The subject of the first research project of ACA was health and its corollary, physical education which concluded, 'The members of the Association are convinced that the low standard of health among women in and after college life is largely due to their common lack of physical training and disregard of the laws of health before they enter college.'

Following evils:

- 1. Girls too often stimulated to shine socially and intellectually at the same time.
- 2. Habitual loss of sufficient and healthy sleep.

- 3. Irregularity and haste in taking food (skip breakfast, little lunch).
- 4. Tight, heavy, and insufficient clothing.
- 5. Lack of sufficient outdoor exercise.
- 6. Ambition of parents and daughters to accomplish much in little time.
- 7. Usual postponement of instruction in laws of physiology and hygiene to a college course.

The results of the health investigation were presented by Talbot as secretary of ACA, to the American Social Science Association in September 1885. The original investigation had apparently been abandoned. In reality, it became part of a basic problem in research seen in a different perspective, against a large background."

How familiar this sounds in these days of eating disorders, early onset diabetes due to poor nutrition, and obesity resulting from lack of physical exercise. We must continue to encourage girls to pursue education, especially in non-traditional fields, and stimulate them to shine intellectually. It's a reminder that those who ignore history are doomed to repeat it.
