## President's Message

The NYS District I meeting, hosted by the Jamestown Branch, was held at Chautauqua Institute on October 16th. The theme of this meeting was Standing on the Shoulders of Giants. Buffalo members Barbara Carier, Maria Coppola, Stacey Johnson, Lillis McLean, Sue Oliver, Diane Silvestro, and Sylvia Volk attended. We heard about the other branches' activities and learned much from hearing about the different women who were discussed at this meeting: Shirley Chisholm, the first African American woman presidential candidate, and Marian White, archaeologist, were presented by the Buffalo Branch; Katherine Stoneman, lawyer; and Bertha Stoneman, botanist were presented by the Jamestown Branch; Ann Burns, the first woman chief of police, was presented by Dunkirk-Fredonia Branch. These women accomplished much in the face of adversity.

On October 30th the Branch program is at Daemen College where the new Eco Trail, built in a non-functional area, will be featured. Daemen students and alumni are very happy with this new 'green' addition to the campus.

Book Sale sorting is ongoing. Books may be delivered to the Kensington-Bailey site on Tuesday and Wednesday mornings. We need to keep this in mind for the upcoming months as we move toward another tremendous book sale. Book donations to the sale are very welcome, as are cash donations for table rentals.

We want to support as many Western New York women students as possible. Funds for Education is used to support women and men students, and the deadline is the same as Chamberlin.
