Laura Wright, a volunteer non-member at the Book Sale who has long been familiar with the Sale wrote a letter to Judy Clare. In it she said, "I've served on many boards and committees in my life, but never have I met such dedicated and inspirational women as the most active and supportive members of AAUW. I thank you, for being who you are and for all that you do, both for myself and for all women, and for all the changes and opportunities you have and will bring about for women and society."

Laura sums up the spirit found at our annual Book Sale and reflects on the kinds of opportunities the sale gives to our community.

Once again the Sale was a great success. The net profit was over \$60,000.

121 members participated before, during and after the Sale. Their combined volunteer hours totaled about 41,000. Thank you to Barb Emer who coordinated the effort to contact members for volunteering.

It is estimated that we had over 150,000 books. The site once again secured by Cathy Weiss was a perfect venue for the Sale. The many Table Chairs following Pat Baker's detailed directions arranged the books perfectly.

Our "good guys", Larry Clare, Dick Emer, Stanley Collesano, Jim Falleta, Carl Ressman, Fred Howard, Mike Marino, Paul Mac-Clennan, George Oliver, Bill Powers, John Preble, Vince Tarzia, and Chris Warden, supplied the necessary muscle and knowhow for important jobs.

Each year brings new innovation to the Sale. This year we began dealing with a company, Green Is Good, LLC, (GIGGL) who contacted Pat MacClennan, after reading our publicity on the internet. They contracted to take all our leftover books (about 12,000). On Clean-up Day a huge truck drove in. The left-over books were slid off the tables onto "gaylords" a word not in all of our vocabularies! In turn a rented forklift put the gaylords on the truck. It was some operation to watch. GIGGL will sell these books on the Internet and give us a part of the proceeds. Leona Barback, Book Sale Treasurer, tells us that some of the books have already been sold. To think that there have been times when we needed to **pay** to have the leftovers taken away.

A few years ago we started recording the names and contact information of our customers electronically. The first few years it was difficult to find enough computer literate volunteers to man the computer. We are now much more sophisticated and those Interviewer slots were all filled.

Leona Barback has assembled a fine team of assistants to the Treasurer. Betty Preble also helped refine the process of collecting and recording the cash receipts during the Book Sale.

Jacquie Walker was once again so helpful as the Honorary Chair. One of her assistants who came to the Sale when Jacquie visited told us the AAUW Book Sale is one of Jacquie's favorite charities. The Book Sale committee is nearing closure on the selection of the Jacquie Walker Scholarship winner. That winner will be invited to the Pot Luck Dinner on September 13th. Jacquie and her husband will attend as well.

The Steering Committee wishes to thank the branch and friends of the branch who made the 56th Sale one of the most successful in history. By the way we had a large number of friends of members help with the Sale. A special thank you goes to them and to the members who encouraged them to come.

At a meeting on August 11, the Buffalo Branch Board approved \$25,500 in Chamberlin Fund/Funds for Education grants and loans to be shared by nine applicants in the June 1 cycle.

The Chamberlin Fund committee, after interviewing candidates on July 31, recommended a dispersal of \$15,500 in grants and \$10,000 in loans.

The applicant pool of 10, (one of whom was disqualified) comprised the largest number of applications we received in the past five years.

Awards and recipients include:

- Lakesha Dillard, a 35-year-old single mother who will complete an RN degree in Trocaire College this fall semester and plans to work on a bachelor's degree in nursing in D'Youville College: \$3,000 grant.
- Melissa Brown, a Grove City College graduate working on a master's degree in social work in University of Buffalo: \$2,000 loan and \$1,000 grant.
- Courtney Glick, a Niagara County Community College graduate, who will be a junior in University at Buffalo majoring in psychology: \$1,500 loan and \$500 grant.
- Michelle George, a UB graduate attending Colgate Rochester Crozer Di-

vinity School with plans to graduate in May 2013: \$3,000 grant.

- Samantha King, a sophomore in Duquesne University majoring in international relations: \$1,500 loan and \$1,500 grant.
- Grace Mukupa, a native of Zambia, graduate of Southern Connecticut State University with an MBA from Oswego State College, working for a doctoral degree in global gender studies in UB. \$3,000 grant from Chamberlin and FFE funds.
- Ruth Simmons, a graduate of Rochester Institute of Technology with a master's degree from UB, completing a doctoral degree in UB: \$1,500 Chamberlin Ioan and \$1,500 FFE grant.
- Brittany Smykowski, Niagara University sophomore majoring in business: \$1,500 loan and \$1,500 grant.
- Elizabeth Suchan, Canisius College senior majoring in sociology and social work: \$2,000 loan and \$500 grant.


