

Lilly Ledbetter was born in a house with no running water or electricity in the small town of Possum Trot, Alabama. She believed that she was destined for something more, and in 1979, with two young children at home and over the initial objections of her husband Charles, Ledbetter applied for her dream job at the Goodyear Tire & Rubber Factory in Gadsden, Alabama. She got the job—one of the first women hired at the management level.

Though she faced daily gender prejudice and sexual harassment, Ledbetter pressed onward, believing that eventually things would change. Nineteen years after her first day at Goodyear, Lilly received an anonymous note revealing that she was making thousands less per year than the men in her position. Determined to challenge this, she filed a sex discrimination case against Goodyear, which she won – and then lost on appeal. Over the next eight years, her case made it all the way to the U.S. Supreme Court, where she lost again: the Court ruled that she should have filed suit within 180 days of her first unequal paycheck – despite the fact that she had no way of knowing that she was being paid unfairly during those years.

Ledbetter never received restitution from Goodyear, but she has said, "I'll be happy if the last thing they say about me after I am gone is that I made a difference." Lilly Ledbetter's efforts to establish equal pay for men and women resulted in President Barack Obama's first piece of legislation – the Lilly Ledbetter Fair Pay Act.

Her talk is free and open to the public. Following her presentation, copies of *Grace and Grit: My Fight for Equal Pay and Fairness at Goodyear and Beyond* (by Lilly Ledbetter with Lanier Scott), will be available for signing and purchase.

WOMEN AND RETIREMENT SECURITY



Since its founding in 1881, AAUW has been committed to promoting equity for all women. As part of this effort, AAUW's 2011-2013 Public Policy Program advocates "strengthening retirement benefits and programs, including pension improvements and protecting Social Security from privatization."

The current Social Security system is more than just a retirement program; across the lifespan, it is one of the most successful anti-poverty programs in our nation's history, providing benefits to many children, disabled workers, surviving spouses, and retirees. Many older women depend on social Security as their

primary source of retirement income. The traditional "three-legged stool" retirement model of Social Security, pensions, and savings for retirement is insufficient for many women because pensions and private savings options are often unavailable or inadequate for women and their work/life patterns. Reform of all three options is needed to secure financial stability for women retirees.

Continuing pay inequity results in women having fewer savings and lower pension benefits, leaving them on an unequal footing in retirement. For example, in 2009, the median income among women 65 and older was \$10,000 less than the median income for men 65 and older, and older women's Social Security benefits were 71 percent of older men's benefits.

AAUW believes that it is vital to women's economic security to provide for the long-term solvency of Social Security and to maintain its current guaranteed benefits. In addition, AAUW supports measures to increase women's ability to participate in alternate forms of retirement programs. This includes counting the time women take off as part of the Family Medical Leave Act (FMLA) towards vesting, promoting the availability of 401(k) and other defined contribution plans for part-time workers, and encouraging more women to work in higher wage, non-traditional jobs. AAUW strongly supports initiatives that seek to close the persistent and sizable wage gaps between men and women, and minorities as well, to further reduce the inequity in retirement security.

April 9, 2013 is Equal Pay Day, symbolizing how far into 2013 women must work to earn what men earned in 2012. Join us for the Unhappy Hour on April 9 at 5:30 at Templeton Landing in honor of Equal Pay Day.

April Highlights in US Women's History

- Apr 2, 1931 17-year-old Jackie Mitchell, the second woman to play baseball in the all-male minor leagues, pitches an exhibition game against NY Yankees and strikes out both Babe Ruth and Lou Gehrig. The next day, the Baseball Commissioner voided her contract, claiming baseball was too strenuous for women. The ban was not overturned until 1992
- Apr 5, 1911 100,000 to 500,000 people march in New York City to attend the funeral of 7 unidentified people who died in the Triangle Shirtwaist Company fire in late March
- Apr 7, 1805 Sacagawea begins helping the Lewis and Clark Expedition as an interpreter
- Apr 7, 1987 Opening of the National Museum of Women in the Arts in Washington, DC, the first museum devoted to women artists
- Apr 9, 1939 Marian Anderson sings an Easter Sunday concert for more than 75,000 at Lincoln Memorial
- Apr 13, 1933 Ruth Bryan Owens is the first woman to represent the U.S. as a foreign minister when she is appointed as envoy to Denmark
- Apr 19, 1977 15 women in the House of Representatives form the Congressional Caucus for Women's Issues
- April 22, Earth Day honor Rachel Carson today, a woman who changed America and greatly influenced the environmental movement; buy her revolutionary book, Silent Spring at www.nwhp.org
- April 26, 1777 American Revolution heroine Sybil Ludington, 16 years old, rides 40 miles by horseback in the middle of the night to warn the American militia that the British were invading
- Apr 28, 1993 First "Take Our Daughters to Work" day, sponsored by the Ms. Foundation; in 2003 it became "Take Our Daughters and Sons to Work" day
