Some of you may have heard me talking excitedly

about my upcoming trip to the Holy Land! A group of friends from my church will travel to Israel for 10 days. We'll go to some of the sites we've all read about: Jerusalem, Nazareth, Bethlehem, and Jericho. We'll see the River Jordan, which flows through the Sea of Galilee south to the Dead Sea. These are some of the most famous bodies of water in the world. At least three major religions trace their history to events in this area.

In studying the geography of the River Jordan, I've learned that the Sea of Galilee is in a fertile area, the largest freshwater lake in Israel (and the world's only fresh body of water below sea level.) The river gives back to the people around it as it flows into and out of the Sea. However, the Dead Sea accepts the fresh water from the River Jordan but has no outlet. The land around it is barren. The water is so salty that one cannot sink and nobody lives there.

The healthy river nourishes the people around the Sea of Galilee in the same way we can share with those who live around us. As we pass through the recent and coming holidays, I hope that nobody is closing in on herself and living without an outlet for her energies. Are we letting blessings flow through us as the Galilee receives from the north and gives to the south? Or are we like the Dead Sea that only receives and never gives?

December Highlights in US Women's History

Dec 1, 1955 - Rosa Parks refuses to give up her seat on a bus to a white person; her arrest sparks the modern civil rights movement in the US

Dec 5, 1935 - Mary McLeod Bethune creates the National Council of Negro Women

Dec 7, 1941 - Capt. Annie Fox receives the first Purple Heart awarded to a woman for her service while under attack at Pearl Harbor

Dec 10, 1938 - Pearl S. Buck receives the Nobel Prize for Literature for "The Good Earth"

Dec 10, 1869 - Wyoming is the first territory to give women the right to vote

Dec 13, 1993 - Susan A. Maxman becomes first woman president of the American Institute of Architects in its 135 year history

Dec 14, 1961 - President's Commission on the Status of Women is established to examine discrimination against women and ways to eliminate it

Dec 14, 1985 - Wilma Mankiller is sworn in as principal chief of the Cherokee Nation of Oklahoma - the first woman in modern history to lead a major Native American tribe

Dec 17, 1993 - Judith Rodin is named president of Univ. of Pennsylvania, the first woman to head an Ivy League institution

Dec 28, 1967 - Muriel Siebert becomes the first woman to own a seat on the NY Stock Exchange

"AAUW 101" Summary



Eileen Hartmann, the immediate past AAUW-NYS president

A BIG thank-you to Eileen Hartmann, the immediate past AAUW-NYS president who joined us on November 12 to lead a discussion of AAUW and what it means to us at all levels. The November Advocate posed a series of questions which were answered by Eileen, our CFO Michelle Norris, and our Scholarship Director Susan McClary.

Eileen referred everyone to the AAUW national website (aauw.org) and the state website (aauw-nys. org) for background on many of the issues. There was a discussion of the "big teal machine" (our faithful volunteer lobby corps, composed of members in the Washington DC area who travel to "The Hill" every week armed with information on current potential legislation of interest to AAUW.) That group is joined by the entire national convention body when the

conventions are located there. She also explained the "Empire State Branch", which is a virtual branch tackling issues of interest to the state. About fifty members have joined it as their "secondary" branch while maintaining their primary membership at home.

In addition, an overview of the complicated local financial setup was explained. We have five treasurers who have separate, specific responsibilities.

- The Operations Treasurer handles dues, insurance, the PO Boxes, etc the nitty gritty of keeping the organization going.
- The Education Accounts and Program Treasurer is the coordinator for the investment account and handles the income and expenses for the programs and scholarships (other than Chamberlin and Funds for Education).
- The Chamberlin/Funds for Education Treasurer probably has the most complicated job because she handles loan repayments (or lack thereof). The Chamberlin Fund itself is a legacy of Sarah Chamberlin, while Funds for Education was set up by the branch. Both are basically loan funds, but can provide grants.
- The fundraising treasurer handles the booksale account and any other big fundraising event.
- The special projects treasurer (who currently happens to also be the booksale treasurer) is currently involved with the Tech Savvy program.

Susan McClary handed out a copy of the scholarship chart summary which is available on the Buffalo AAUW website (aauw.buffalo.edu). There was discussion and questioning of some of the offerings and some requirements will be clarified.

Several comments were generated through the discussion. Suggestions for working towards the future included stepping up our use of social media, increased visibility for the Hillary Clinton Fund (don't know what that is? – ASK!), the mentoring of local college students and more outreach to women in the community.
