Feminist Pioneers in Religious Pluralism

Join us to hear Rev. Stokes speak about the first World's Parliament of Religions convened in Chicago in 1893 as part of the Columbian Exposition (often called "the Chicago World's Fair"). Remarkably, many of the speakers were women—almost 10%. At a time when the voices of women were not often heard in public places, and

when women were not accepted as religious leaders, these pioneers broke with accepted conventions.

Sadly, the contribution of women to the World's Parliament in 1893 is a story that has gone untold for over 100 years. The speaker looks forward to sharing research from her ongoing, book-length study, *Feminist Pioneers in Religious Pluralism*.

Rev. Stokes is Founding Director of the Women's Interfaith Institute. In November she celebrated 31 years of ordination in the United Church of Christ. There will be a small charge of \$5 and light refreshments will be

served.

Here's hoping that all of you looked carefully at the 2012 AAUW Annual Report. It delineates all the ways that AAUW empowers women. You can see how all of us help with our donations and programs that improve and advance the lives of women and girls.



I was particularly struck by the article on page 19 entitled 2012 Accomplishments. Finally Arezou Mansourian, Christine Ng, and Lauren Mancuso won their Title IX suit against UC Davis. The Legal Advocacy Fund started to support this case in 2005, signed on to an amicus brief in 2009, and featured the case in the 2010 report.

The women took on this battle when the school cut the women's wrestling team, alleging that it was part of the school's policy of not sufficiently expanding athletic opportunities under Title IX.

The plaintiffs stuck it out until a settlement was reached in 2011. The plaintiffs believe that one of the reasons they managed to hold out for so long was the support of women from local AAUW branches. These women attended all of the hearings and provided food and moral support.

It makes me feel good to know that we are there for each other!

AAUW & THE FISCAL CLIFF - What's next?

Late on New Year's Day, the House of Representatives passed the Senate bill to pull us back from the so-called "fiscal cliff," the combination of tax and spending changes that could have sent the U.S. economy back into a recession. But this dealt only with the tax changes and merely delayed the spending cuts, which means we still have work to do.

Like any compromise, the deal is far from perfect, but it includes several AAUW-supported provisions that will help women and their families, such as:

- Returning to the Clinton-era tax rates for highincome earners while continuing the current rates for the middle class.
- Extending the "American Opportunity Tax Credit," a \$2,500 tax credit to help college students and their families pay for tuition and related expenses.

- Ending the payroll tax holiday to protect Social Security's long-term solvency.
- Delaying the automatic, across-the-board spending cuts for two months, giving Congress more time to find a way to protect key programs from sequestration.

The automatic spending cuts have been delayed, but they are still dangerous. In the next two months, Congress will need to find a solution to avoid deep cuts to important investments such as education, funding for civil rights enforcement, women's health programs, and workforce training programs.

There will be key moments in the coming debate when we need to urge Congress to protect these important programs from sequestration. AAUW members should keep the pressure on their elected officials.

February Highlights in US Women's History

• Feb 1, 1978 - First postage stamp to honor a black woman, Harriet Tubman, is issued in Washington, DC

- Feb 4, 1987 First National Women in Sports Day is celebrated by Presidential Proclamation
- Feb. 12 1869 the Utah Territory passes a law allowing women to vote
- Feb 15, 1921 The Suffrage Monument, depicting Susan B. Anthony, Elizabeth Cady Stanton, and Lucretia Mott, and carved by Adelaide Johnson, is dedicated at the U.S. Capitol
- **Feb 15, 1953** Tenley Albright is the first American woman to win the World Figure Skating championship
- Feb 17, 1870 Esther Hobart Morris became the first American woman Justice of the Peace
- Feb 24, 1912 Henrietta Szold founds Hadassah, the largest Jewish organization in American history, focusing on healthcare and education in the Israel and the US
- Feb 24, 1967 Jocelyn Bell Burnell makes the first discovery of a pulsar, a rapidly rotating neutron star
- Feb 25 1986 Corazon Aquino sworn in as the first woman President of the Philippines
- Feb 27, 1922 US Supreme Court upholds the 19th Amendment to the Constitution which guarantees women the right to vote
