# ARE VOTERS LOSING THEIR VOICE IN OUR GOVERNMENT?

AAUW Buffalo is the host branch for this year's NYS District One Conference, which includes the Jamestown, Dunkirk-Fredonia, and Genesee Community College Branches. This is a joint meeting with area LWV and AAUW branches The LWVs of Chautauqua County and Rochester are also invited to join us. The general public is welcome.

The morning session will focus on our most pressing political issues, especially the increasing efforts to limit voter participation. The panel of experts will discuss some of the issues facing us today including voter photo id, redistricting, limitations on voter registration and voting times, the influence of PACs, and other issues.

#### The Panel

The **moderator, Lee Coppol**a, was recently inducted into the WNY Broadcasters Hall of Fame. He retired after serving for 15 years as the first dean of the journalism school at St. Bonaventure University. Before that, he was a newspaper reporter, a television investigative reporter, and a federal prosecutor. As a journalist he won more than 30 local, New York State and national awards, including the George Polk Award, the National Press Club Consumer Journalism Award and the Investigative Editors and Reporters Award. He won the New York State Associated Press Investigative Reporting Award both as a print and broadcast journalist. He covered organized crime as a journalist and is considered a national expert in the field. His work as a reporter about the witness protection of a government informant was the basis for a book and movie, "Hide in Plain Sight."

**Craig Bucki** is a lawyer with Phillips Lytle and is experienced with election laws and representing political candidates in election law disputes, and challenging the constitutionality of state statutes and municipal ordinances. He has managed a campaign, graduated magna cum laude from Yale, worked with election inspectors, published articles in law journals.

**Debora Michaux** is adjunct professor at Buffalo State College in the teacher education program, former dean of employment and training at the One Stop Employment and Training Center, former Republican state committeeman, and delegate to the 2012 Republican National Convention. She is a certified school district administrator.

**Janet Massaro** is a League of Women Voters member who has led redistricting efforts on local, county, and state levels. She has been active in LWV endeavors on environmental issues and health care.

After lunch, **Dr. Sally Roesch Wagner** will enlighten the audience on some of the little-known stories of the fight for women's voting rights. Sally is the executive director of the Matilda Joslyn Gage Home in Fayetteville and her presentation is courtesy of the New York Humanities Council. Matilda Joslyn Gage is the almost-forgotten member of the trio (along with Susan B Anthony and Elizabeth Cady Stanton) who led the women's suffrage movement in the late 19th century. Come and enjoy the chance to network with other AAUW branches and LWV chapters. The cost, including coffee and pastries plus lunch, will be \$20. Remember that this event is open to the public. # NATIONAL RECOGNITION FOR OUTSTANDING GIVING BY THE BUFFALO BRANCH

Buffalo Branch has received the award of FIRST PLACE in TOTAL BRANCH GIVING from our National Association. This is in appreciation of our significant contributions in combined support of all of AAUW's Programmatic Areas. This is one of the Breaking through Barriers awards given to branches across the country.

We received another national FIRST PLACE FOR TOTAL GIVING to the Educational Opportunities Fund. These monies are used for fellowships and grants for women. We
