- FactCheck.org is a nonpartisan, nonprofit "consumer advocate" for voters that aims to reduce the level of deception and confusion in U.S. politics.
- PolitiFact.com is a project of the St. Petersburg Times to help you find the truth in American politics.
- OpenSecrets.org is your nonpartisan guide to money's influence on U.S. elections and public policy.
- Snopes.com is one of the best online resources that debunks Urban Legends and Rumors on a huge number of topics.
- TruthOrFiction.com is your Email Reality Check. Get the truth about those ubiquitous forwarded emails.
- Hoax-Slayer.com is dedicated to debunking email hoaxes, thwarting Internet scammers, combating spam, and educating web users about email and Internet security issues.

Then, once you're satisfied that you understand an issue, take action! Educate your family and friends, move the conversation from rumor to facts. We can make a difference!

## The 2012 Olga Lindberg Scholars

The committee received materials from 12 students who met the eligibility requirements. Each was reviewed per the previously used assessment criteria. The committee then unanimously recommended the following winners who were approved by the board:

1st Place Award (at \$10,000): Grace Mukupa, currently pursuing a Ph.D. in Global Gender Studies at the University at Buffalo. Ms. Mukupa is also has an MBA from of the State University of New York at Oswego and BA from the Southern Connecticut State University, with high academic achievement. After achieving her Ph.D., Grace plans to attend law school. Grace's goal is to work for the government or NGO to formulate programs to alleviate poverty. Her dissertation centers on women and development, youth educational programs, poverty alleviation, and evaluation. Grace's current roles include: President, of the Graduate Student Association, an AAUW university liaison, a United Nations Representative, Adjunct Instructor for Gender in African and Traditional Law in African Societies at the University at Buffalo. Her references noted her as one of the most dedicated, diligent and intelligent graduate student they have ever taught. In addition, all her references noted her important MA work on the impact

of a non-governmental organization on youth empowerment and HIV/AIDS prevention paying particular attention to the disparity that exists between boys and girls.

2nd Place Award (at \$5,000): Kaitlynn Trzaska, graduated this May with a BS

in Exercise and Sports Studies from D'Youville College and this summer will enter Physical Therapy School to obtain her Doctorate in Physical Therapy in May 2015. Her short term goal is to obtain strength and conditioning certification from the prestigious National Strength and Conditioning Association, however, her long term goal is to open her own physical therapy clinic for the disabled. Kaitlynn's community involvement is impressive and includes the following: certified Special Olympics Coach, and Hippotherapy Side Walker volunteer, which is physical therapy on a horse for children with physical and mental disabilities. Her references noted her enthusiasm and dedication to her education experience. They also noted the tremendous value she places on service and charity to unconditionally assist the less fortunate.

## Chamberlin Fund/Funds for Education

Chamberlin Fund/FFE Committee recommended approval for the dispersal of \$37,500 to 13 applicants in the June 1, 2012 cycle. The allocation involves \$16.500 in loans and \$21,000 in grants and will be drawn from the Chamberlin Fund, with the exception of one award from Funds for Education. The following recommendations were approved by the board:

- Ashley Bernier, a junior in University of Buffalo, majoring in speech-language pathology. \$2,000 grant and \$1,000 loan.
- Bridget Flynn, a sophomore in Canisius College, majoring in health and wellness, \$1,500 loan and \$1,500 grant.
- Antoinette Foster, a sophomore nursing student in D'Youville College, \$2,500 grant, \$500 loan.
- Taylor Kunkle, junior in Seton Hall University majoring in biology in program leading to a doctorate in physical therapy, \$1,500 grant, \$1,500 loan.
- Angela Hedgecock, a graduate student in Canisius College's teaching English to speakers of another language program, \$1,500 grant.
- Valerie Herman, junior in Niagara University majoring in hospitality, \$1,500 loan, \$1,500 grant.
- Allison Jacobs, graduate student in special education in St. Bonaventure University, \$3,000 grant.
- **Samantha King**, senior in Duquesne University studying international law, \$3,000 loan.
  - Evan Mikoll, junior in Medaille College in communications, a \$1,500 loan and \$1,500 grant from Funds for Education
  - Danielle Miller, a junior accounting major in Northwood University, West Palm Beach,

Fla., a \$3,000 loan.

Without all of the above angels, we would not have grossed over \$66,000 this year to fund our marvelous scholarships, fellowships and grants. In a year when the economy was down and gas prices were up; when e-books are soaring in popularity and book dealers declining in numbers; when our aging members (all

right-admit it) are unable to do as much as they would like to and we had to put up with more aches and pains and allergies (not to mention a broken bone!) we carried on to support this worthy cause! THANK YOU--ALL OF YOU--for your dedication to the AAUW Buffalo Book Sale! According to Judy Weidemann, our wonderful, able, willing co-chair, the total hours worked this year exceeded 4,000:

564 during the year at Kensington/Bailey, 2,331 cleaning, sorting books and organizing, 1,202 during the sale.

112 members (down from 128 in 2011) worked in some way this year, as well as thirty-four friends and family members.

We rejoice that our sale was again profitable, but are also mindful of some trends. It appeared that we had fewer donations of books this year and a considerable amount of books that needed to be recycled. Table donations were less than previous years. Expenses have been rising, while profits have been declining. We had more books left over. We lost Giggil and their \$2,000 for the past two years, they had picked up all of our books and sent us a percentage of profits from their resale. Fortunately, through the efforts of our good friend, Laura Wright, we were able to secure a local company, led by Mark Gamble to take all of our leftover items.

Special recognition to our hard-working, book sale-loving steering committee consisting of Cathy Weiss, Judy Weidemann, Pat Swift MacClennan, Sue Licata, Cindy Koch, Peggy Meinl, and Barbara Libby. Co-Branch Presidents Betty Preble and Barbara Carier have been strong and consistent supporters of the committee and the sale. We added three new members to the committee this year, and they have pitched right in--Sue, Cindy, and Peggy. The entire committee deserves our heartfelt thanks for all their dedication and hard, hard work.

My heart is bursting with gratitude for those who made my job as site manager go smoothly, allowing a steady progression towards opening our doors on the first day with enthusiasm. We ended with cleanup on Monday and Tuesday. WELL DONE!!!

#### September Highlights in US Women's History

- Sept 12, 1910 Alice Stebbins Wells, a former social worker, becomes the first woman police officer with arrest powers in US (Los Angeles, CA)
- Sept 14, 1964 Helen Keller receives the Presidential Medal of Freedom along with 4 other women: Dr. Lena Edwards, Lynn Fontainne, Dr. Helen Taussig, and Leontyne Price
- Sept 14, 1975 Elizabeth Ann Seton is canonized. She is the first American-born saint, and founded the first U.S. Order of Sisters of Charity of St. Joseph
- Sept 20, 1973 Billie Jean King defeats Bobby "No broad can beat me" Riggs in the battle of the sexes tennis match
- Sept 25, 1981 Sandra Day O'Connor is sworn in as the first woman U.S. Supreme Court justice
- Sept 26, 1971 Rep. Shirley Chisholm (D-New York) announces she will enter the Democratic presidential primaries
- Sept 26, 1973 Capt. Lorraine Potter, an American Baptist minister, is the first woman U.S. Air Force chaplain
- Sept 29, 1988 Stacy Allison becomes first U.S. woman to reach the summit of Mt. Everest
