AAUW and the UNITED STATES BUDGET

During these tough budgetary times, AAUW calls on Congress to come together around a balanced approach to deficit reduction that does not include the harmful spending cuts of sequestration. AAUW is opposed to spending cuts that attempt to balance the nation's budget on the backs of vulnerable Americans, including students, women, and working families.

AAUW believes that any agreement must be balanced. We shouldn't cut programs for the young, the old, and the vulnerable while protecting cuts to other programs. Any agreement must include additional revenues, not additional hardships.

Second, AAUW believes any agreement should create capacity, not destroy it. While some argue that Pell Grants for college students or job training for displaced workers is too expensive, think about how much human potential we would lose if we didn't provide these opportunities. A few dollars spent today can create hundreds of dollars for our economy in the future.

Finally, AAUW strongly believes that any package must honor the commitments we've made to one another. Social Security, Medicare, and Medicaid are promises that we've made as a society — no one should starve or die because they're too poor or too old. Congress needs to leave these programs alone.

We face difficult decisions as a country. But this argument isn't just about numbers — it's about who we are and who we

want to be as a country. AAUW urges our elected officials to enact a sensible, balanced proposal that allows our economy to grow and lets Americans live in dignity and prosperity.

What is the Federal Deficit? The deficit is the difference between the money federal government takes in, called receipts, and what it spends, called outlays, each year. The federal government generates revenue through income, excise and social

insurance taxes as well as fees, according to the U.S. Department of Treasury's Bureau of the Public Debt.

The spending includes Social Security and Medicare benefits along with all other outlays such as medical research and interest payments on the debt. When the amount of spending exceeds the level of income, there is a deficit and the Treasury must borrow the money needed for the government to pay its bills.

How the Government Borrows The federal government borrows money by selling Treasury securities such as T-bills, notes, inflation-protected securities and savings bonds to the public. The government trust funds are required by law to invest surpluses in Treasury securities.

What is the National Debt? The amount of the Treasury securities issued to the public and to the government trust funds is considered that year's deficit and becomes part of the larger, ongoing national debt. One way to think about the debt is as the government's accumulated deficits, the Bureau of the Public Debt suggests.

Our Daughters Carry On

In Cameroon, girls' education generally holds less value than boys' education. Girls often leave the educational system before completing secondary school. Girls are frequently sent to work in the fields or market to help support the family, or they may be married in their early teens. Each year that a girl stays in school reduces her risk of health problems related to HIV or early pregnancy and increases her likelihood of eventually having a healthy family. A2Empowerment, a nonprofit company founded in 2008 by Buffalo natives Anne Cheung and Anne Rapin, provides educational scholarships and support to girls in Cameroon so that they may increase their knowledge and empower themselves to lead healthier, more productive lives.

A2Empowerment works with Peace Corps Volunteers in Cameroon to identify and award scholarships to young women based on need and merit, with a priority placed on selecting girls in the later years of high school when they are at a higher risk of dropping out. Peace Corps Volunteers continue to mentor the scholarship recipients throughout the year through monthly meetings where academic progress is monitored and life skills topics are covered, such as critical thinking, money management, and women's health maintenance. In addition, scholarship recipients are asked to give back to their communities by tutoring younger students or presenting topics to the community on women's empowerment or health issues.

Since its founding in 2008, A2Empowerment has awarded over 200 scholarships to young women in Cameroon. In 2013, A2Empowerment plans to award over 80 scholarships in 8 of the 10 regions of Cameroon. Approximately \$65 USD covers tuition and school fees, as well as school supplies and books in some cases, for a year of school for one student. All overhead costs are covered by the company co-founders, so the full amount of all donations is put towards scholarships. To find out more about A2Empowerment please visit:
