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Achievement Award





The museum is a national award-winning organization (Association of Children's Museums 2013 Promising Practices Award for its immersive Culture Days program), and the museum work on Master Planning will be featured as a best practices model at the 2014 International Children's Museum Conference.

Ms. Park Leggett has been a panelist for the Federal Institute of Museum and Library Services, the New York State Council on the Arts and for several local agencies. She has presented at both national and state museum conferences. Prior to working at Explore & More, she was the Director of Public Relations and Marketing at the Buffalo Museum of Science, and worked in public television at WNFD and WGBH-Boston.

SPREAD THE WORD ABOUT THE AAUW PUBLIC POLICY PROGRAM!

The Buffalo News reports that there are 6,383 registered lobby-ists in Albany retained for a record \$191 million. As they work behind the scenes, these special interest groups pay little attention to issues such as special protections for women in the workplace, state aid for children of undocumented immigrants, a minimum wage increase, or job creation incentives. Their primary focus may be on civil liability laws, tort insurance, regulatory rules and issues that influence their financial interests.

Although we may not have the deep pockets of some lobbyists, the right to petition government is open to anyone who wants to push for changes in laws and policies. Since AAUW's founding our members and supporters have spoken out about policies important to women and girls. Without AAUW voices, invaluable legislation such as the Family and Medical Leave Act,

the Matthew Shepard and James Byrd Jr. Hate Crimes Prevention Act, and the Lilly Ledbetter Fair Pay Act, would have never been passed. In recent years, AAUW's policy work connects and rallies advocates at the local, state, national, and global levels to advance our work to empower women and girls. AAUW uses lobbying and grassroots efforts to push forward policies that break through educational and economic barriers for women.

The AAUW Public Policy Program for 2013-2015 underscores AAUW's mission of advancing equity for women and girls through advocacy, education, philanthropy, and research and speaks to women's needs, aspirations, and concerns across the life span. The work of AAUW builds upon more than 130 years of responsible public participation. Implicit in each of our principles is support for government agencies administering programs, including adequate appropriations, effective and accountable administration, and provision for citizen

participation. We advocate public discussion to ensure enlightened decisions on these principles. We work to increase the number of underrepresented populations, including women, in policy- and other decision-making positions. AAUW is committed to working in partnership with diverse allies and coalitions to break through educational and economic barriers for women and girls.

Biennial priorities for action on the federal level are chosen according to the criteria of viability, critical need, strong member support, and potential for distinctive AAUW contribution or leadership. No order of importance is implied but we support a strong system of public education that promotes gender fairness, equity, and diversity; achievement of economic self-sufficiency for all women; and equality, individual rights, and social justice for a diverse society.

AAUW helps us to know the issue before launching a lobbying effort.

Thirty-six truly amazing young women from 27 Erie and Niagara County high schools submitted applications for this scholarship. Each had a grade point average of at least 95 or 3.5! It is heartening to know our future is in the hands of such high-achieving, hardworking, multitalented women who plan to study and work in a wide range of fields.

The committee made the bittersweet decision to award each of the \$2000 scholarships to Kelsey Jaynes from Starpoint High School and Samantha Maloy from Holland Jr/Sr High School. Each is the valedictorian of her class. Even though it was not a consideration, we have again selected one woman from Erie County and one from Niagara County.



Kelsey Jaynes' goal is to pursue a career in medicine, but she also has an interest in engineering. Inspired by her research at Roswell Park Cancer Institute her undergraduate program in either chemistry or chemical engineering will not only satisfy premed requirements, but allow her to

continue taking additional courses in mathematics and language. Having been accepted by the University of Vermont, Kelsey will surely continue to use her considerable leadership and athletic skills for a rich collegiate life. She's been class President (grades 9-12), Varsity Soccer Captain (grade 12), and Varsity Track Captain (grades 11-12). While being a member, often in a leadership role, of many other school clubs, she still finds enthusiasm for volunteer activities like Lock In to Lock Out Cancer, teaching Sunday School, Project Prevention (helping a refugee family assimilate into America), and Hearts for the Homeless. Her awards, recognitions, and honors clearly indicate her enthusiasm for learning and service is long-standing. While in high school Kelsey was diagnosed with Lupus, but remains undaunted so her life is not determined by disease.

Kelsey concludes her personal role model essay (about Dr. Elizabeth Repasky of RPMI) explaining, "It is my goal to join the force of women making an impact in the community, and I hope that one day I can be an inspiration and a motivating leader."

Her enthusiasm for community projects and gardening inspired her to remodel the "Memory Garden" at her school. One of her most powerful volunteer activities was working with mentally disabled adults in the Kiwanis' Aktion Club wrapping presents and making stockings that they distributed to children. She describes this experience as "priceless." Samantha has been awarded numerous awards, recognitions, and honors including Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute Medal and US Achievement Academy National Leadership and Service Award. She describes her mastering of time management of involvement in school, community, work, family, sports and clubs while taking a step back to be thankful for her blessings a balance between serenity and ongoing chaos "by far, my greatest achievement."
