December Highlights in US Women's History

December 1, 1955 - Rosa Parks refuses to give up her seat on a bus to a white person; her arrest sparks the modern civil rights movement in the US

December 5, 1935 - Mary McLeod Bethune creates the National Council of Negro Women

December 7, 1941 - Capt. Annie Fox receives the first Purple Heart awarded to a woman for her service while under attack at Pearl Harbor

December 10, 1869 - Wyoming is the first territory to give women the right to vote

December 10, 1938 - Pearl S. Buck receives the Nobel Prize for Literature for *The Good Earth*

December 13, 1993 - Susan A. Maxman becomes first woman president of the American Institute of Architects in its 135 year history

December 14, 1961 - President's Commission on the Status of Women is established to examine discrimination against women

December 14, 1985 - Wilma Mankiller is sworn in as principal chief of the Cherokee Nation of Oklahoma - the first woman in modern history to lead a major Native American tribe

December 17, 1993 - Judith Rodin is named president of Univ. of Pennsylvania, the first woman to head an Ivy League institution

December 28, 1967 - Muriel Siebert becomes the first woman to own a seat on the N.Y. Stock Exchange



AAUW Has Gone Global

The trend toward globalization and the dominant role of the United States in world affairs inspire AAUW to

seek strategic opportunities to increase awareness of issues affecting women and girls worldwide. Through targeted activities and projects at all levels, AAUW promotes programs that address issues of concern to women, hosts international visitors, and promotes global linkages.

When a woman is educated and empowered, she starts to make a difference in her community. This is true all over the world. But women still face barriers that keep education and security out of reach. Only through community support and access to resources like education, health care, and career opportunities will women have the chance to succeed. That's why AAUW has given fellowships to more than 3,000 women in 134 countries and why we regularly speak out on behalf of women and girls at the United Nations and in critical global coalitions.

AAUW is a member of many coalitions that support human rights and equality for women and girls. Collaborations include a strategic partnership with the Clinton Global Initiative and special consultative status with the United Nations, which means we have influential U.N. privileges that other nongovernmental organizations don't have. AAUW also funds projects that address the needs of women and girls in communities around the world.

As our world shrinks and our global community expands, AAUW members and their friends can embark on international trips designed to teach about gender equality issues in other cultures. AAUW sent delegations of members to three continents to learn about the unique challenges in specific countries.

As part of AAUW's International Series on Culture and Gender Roles, delegations of members, staff, and guests have traveled to China, Israel, Cuba, and South Africa. These delegations participated in research, dialogue, cultural events, and educational initiatives.

Check out AAUW Delegation 2014: Cuba to Explore Women's Issues, Challenges, and Opportunities. Cuba is close geographically, but severe travel restrictions still keep most U.S. citizens from visiting. On January 4–12, 2014, an AAUW delegation visits not only Havana, but several cities in the countryside such as Cienfuegos, the heart of Cuba's agricultural area, and Trinidad, a UNESCO world heritage site. They will participate in high-level meetings with important women's groups in Cuba to learn more about the role gender plays in the lives of our Cuban neighbors.

By participating in an AAUW Delegation, you'll share in an open dialogue and help break down the barriers of misinformation about women all over the world.

Education Issues

Everyday it seems we hear more about the dangers of concussion in student athletes. Many districts have developed protocols for dealing with concussions, which have increased significantly in recent years. High school and college athletes seem to be reluctant to self-report the symptoms, but it's hard to deny the obvious short- and long-term dangers of confusion, headache, dizziness, nausea, loss of consciousness, amnesia, and more. Brain injuries from blows to the head may have symptoms for up to a year later, or even life-long implications. Study after study reports abnormal brain scans or other physical problems months after a concussion.

If an injury occurs on school grounds, most teachers are required to report and oversee the recovery. Parents are learning to monitor their children's functioning after an injury which occurs outside the school, and to report any need for accommodations in the learning environment. Additional time for taking tests, wearing sunglasses in bright lights, and excused participation in physical education are possible needs of students recovering from head injuries.
