

We are also expecting up to 200 parents and teachers. All this is in the name of encouraging STEM for girls. The conference is designed to inspire middle school girls to pursue STEM careers (science, technology, engineering, and math)—and to provide adults in their lives with relevant information. *Tech Savvy* features 26 workshops for the girls plus four savvy skills workshops, introducing critical life success skills such as advocacy, negotiating, interview preparation, and ethical decision making. Since *Tech Savvy* is not just for students, adults will enjoy fun and enlightening sessions that include the best of ways to instill confidence within the girls in their lives. We are also planning a very special "play experience" for educators with a team from Learn Fresh, a group that inspires new ways of encouraging education by appealing to children's interests!

Confidence is Key!

TS9 continues a three-year focus on some of the critical aspects we can encourage for long-term STEM – and overall success: persistence, confidence, and resilience. From the *Why So Few* research, we know that being "smart" is not only natural; science and math skills get better with practice. We don't want girls to give up just short of their goal. What is AAUW Doing?

AAUW just finished another busy year advocating for women and girls. In case you missed them, here are a few of the things that have been accomplished or are works in progress:

- AAUW helped lead the fight for passage of the Violence Against Women Act (VAWA). The Lobby Corps and individual members visited congressional offices. Members from around the country sent thousands of messages to congress. Without AAUW, campus sexual assault measures would have been overlooked in this legislation.
- Thanks to the advocacy of AAUW and the National Council for Women and Girls in Education (which AAUW chairs), the Department of Education reaffirmed in a letter to all school districts that pregnant and parenting students are entitled to the same educational opportunities as their peers.
- AAUW Vice President of Government Relations Lisa Maatz was the recipient of the Winn Newman Award from the National Coalition for Pay Equity. A previous winner was Lilly Ledbetter.
- AAUW members have joined with congressional leaders to

- advocate for a new Women's Economic Agenda. AAUW members from Florida, Texas, NEW YORK, Maryland, Massachusetts, Connecticut, California, and Washington have spearheaded this campaign by hosting high-profile issue forums with top congressional leaders. We will be hearing more about this soon.
- AAUW joined the movement to commemorate the 50th anniversary of the March on Washington. In addition to sponsoring a women's luncheon that week, AAUW snagged a seated ticket for a member of the Lobby Corps who was also a Freedom rider to attend the celebrations on the National Mall.
- AAUW provided important research to the U.S. Department of Labor on the status of women in honor of the 50th anniversary of the Influential American Women report.
 AAUW also weighed in on the original report done by the Presidential commission on the Status of Women at Eleanor Roosevelt's invitation.

It should always do your heart good to be reminded of how dedicated and busy this organization is as it is striving to fulfill its mission.

Do You Know the Specifics of What the WEA Will Do?

The full Women's Equality Agenda (WEA) received a push for revitalization in Governor Cuomo's State of the State address. The Governor's renewed commitment reaffirmed the commitment of the New York Women's Equality Coalition to pass WEA into law in 2014 with all the provisions. The Coalition includes the support of 860 women's groups, businesses, religious organizations, medical groups, and advocacy organizations from across the state. AAUW-NYS is a member of the NYWEC Steering Committee.

Briefly, the Women's Equality Act will:

- Achieve Pay Equity: The bill would finally shatter the
 glass ceiling by eliminating the ability of employers to
 point to "any other factor other than sex" to justify pay
 disparities and instead require that their pay decisions
 be based on legitimate reasons. In addition, the legislation would protect an employee's right to share wage
 information with other employees without being retaliated against.
- Stop Sexual Harassment in All Workplaces: The new law would ban sexual harassment in every workplace, regardless of the number of employees, so all workers are protected.
- Remove Barriers to Remedying Discrimination: The legislation would allow successful plaintiffs to recover attorney's fees in employment or credit discrimination cases based on sex.
- End Family Status Discrimination: The bill would prohibit employers from denying work or promotions to workers simply because they have children.
- Stop Housing Discrimination for Victims of Domestic Violence: The new law would prohibit landlords from discriminating against victims of domestic violence.

- Stop Source-of-Income Discrimination: This legislation
 - would prohibit landlords from discriminating against tenants based on lawful source of income.
- Protect Victims of Domestic Violence by Strengthening Order-of-Protection Laws: The legislation creates a pilot program to allow domestic violence victims to seek temporary orders of protection through electronic means rather than having to appear in person.
- Strengthen Human Trafficking Laws: This legislation
 would, in part, eliminate the requirement that
 "coercion" be proven in a sex trafficking prosecution
 when the victims of sex trafficking are minors. In addition, the bill would increase the penalties for trafficking.
- Stop Pregnancy Discrimination Once and For All: The legislation would create a specific protection that requires employers to provide reasonable accommodations for pregnant employees.
- Protect a Woman's Freedom of Choice: This bill would codify existing Supreme Court law to protect a woman's right to obtain an abortion prior to viability, or when necessary to protect her life or health.

New York State needs to update and strengthen laws that secure equal pay for women, provide access to reproductive health care, and freedom from discrimination and violence. Some of these inequities are skillfully presented in a satiric two-minute video entitled "Illegal or Just Sleazy" which is worth a look. It can be found at http://www.youtube.com/watch?v=zqXnqtljKjQ
