

Happy New Year!

I know by the time you read this we will be well past the middle of January and firmly settled into what will no longer be a "new" year. As I write this, though, it seems like everything I read has to do with resolutions and the future. And those are important to think about. But for now I'd like to go a bit into the past, AAUW Buffalo's past, to be specific.

While thinking about heading to the archives at UB for our December program, I re-read the stories of our branch founders - those who "believed in the beauty of their dreams" and wanted to collectively work on the Association of Collegiate Alumni (ACA, predecessor to AAUW) purpose of "practical education work, for collection and publication of statistical and other information concerning education, and in general, for the maintenance of high standards of education." In 1890 there were only eight women in Buffalo who were college graduates and five of them - Harriet Ransom Milinowski, Lena Hill Severance,

M. Wardell, Maude Austin, and Ella C. Lapham formed the nucleus of our branch. One of those names caught my eye, since we have a family history book called "The Laphams in America." Could it be that I was related to Ella? Indeed, as it turned out, we are! If my calculations are correct, this founder of our illustrious branch and I are fifth cousins, twice removed!

From the very beginning our members were involved with helping the University of Buffalo, setting up child care centers, aiding libraries, etc., trying to make a positive difference for Buffalo. We proudly carry on that tradition today. Are you helping?

As you read through those names and the rest of our history (there's a lot on our branch website – click on the "Branch Tools and History" button on the left to get to the page where the documents are listed,) let us know if you have a more personal perspective on any of these wonderful women.

In addition, if you have other branch historical documents, please let us know! We would love to both add them (or copies of them) to our archives AND use them to help celebrate our anniversary.

It's the tenth anniversary! The tenth annual Tech Savvy conference is around the corner! On Saturday, March 14, we will welcome about 500 girls in 6th – 9th grade for the middle school program and approximately 100 10th-12th graders in the Tech Savvy Girls on a Roll program. We are also expecting up to 200 parents and teachers, all in the name of encouraging STEM for girls.

The conference is designed to inspire middle school girls to pursue STEM careers (science, technology, engineering, and math)—and to provide adults in their lives with relevant information. Tech Savvy features 22 workshops for the girls plus four savvy skills workshops, introducing critical life success skills such as advocacy, negotiating, interview preparation, and ethical decision making. Since Tech Savvy is not just for students, adults will enjoy fun and enlightening sessions that include the best of ways to build resilience within the girls in their lives. Our special guest for the adult session is Stacie Gregory, who is completing her doctoral studies in engineering education. A budding expert in stereotype threat, Ms. Gregory will detail some new research around stereotype threat among women in STEM.

In this special 10th anniversary program, we are welcoming back some of your favorite speakers from the past nine years! Several of our keynote speakers are returning to celebrate with us, including Sonya Summerour Clemmons, Dr. Anne Roby, and Camille Alleyne. And, look forward to hearing from one of our former Tech Savvy Girls!

Ready for Resilience?

TS10 continues a three-year focus on some of the critical aspects we can encourage for long term STEM – and overall — success: persistence, confidence,

and resilience. From research, we know that women in STEM often face stereotypes—and they react to these stereotypes in various ways. We want girls to be prepared and to develop the brilliance and resilient exterior to withstand the pressure and shine! 



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FUNDS REPORT: Accolades for AAUW

efore we start our advocacy activities for 2015, I would like to share some of the successes AAUW and LAF achieved in 2014.

In recognition of AAUW's coordinating role in the women's advocacy community to update federal hate crimes prevention legislation, the White House invited **AAUW VP of Government Relations Lisa Maatz** to speak on a panel during a three hour event marking the fifth anniversary of the legislation that eventually passed, (the Matthew Shepard and James Byrd Jr.) **Hate Crimes Prevention Act**.

Following persistent advocacy from AAUW members and visits from our Lobby Corp, the Paycheck Fairness Act gained six more co-sponsors in the Senate.

AAUW members outdid themselves yet again when it came to Equal Pay Day activities around the country! For **Equal Pay Day 2014**, AAUW members organized more than **250 Equal Pay Day activities in at least 43 States**.

AAUW helped focus the conversation on the gap in salaries for coaches of men's and women's teams during the 2014 basketball tournaments. Our winner for both brackets, the Uni-

versity of Dayton, surprised fans by making it to the Elite Eight!



AAUW and AAUW Hawaii successfully urged President Obama to posthumously award the Presidential Medal of Freedom to Hawaii congresswoman and longtime AAUW member Patsy Mink. Mink was the first woman of color elected to Congress in 1964 and was a co-author of Title IX of the Educational Amendments of 1972.

UB was selected as one of the colleges hosting an **Elect Her** – **Campus Women Win** in 2015 which will train women to run for student government and future political office.

These are just a few of the things AAUW is working on and/or accomplished in 2014!

Future articles will contain info on the AAUW focus for 2015, both new and continuing efforts.

We should all be proud of this great organization and continue to support its efforts to better the lives of women and girls!

PAID FAMILY LEAVE

re we ready for an employeefunded, statewide paid family leave
policy in New York State? If the answer
is yes, then we need to persuade Governor Cuomo to make it a priority. He must
be convinced that it will be good for
business and for healthier and more economically secure workers and families.
Both parents work in nearly 60 percent
of two parent families. That percentage
increases to 75 percent for single parent
families. Greater numbers of employed
workers are caring for both children and
aging parents.

Women, as primary caregivers, face gender based inequities in the workplace. Family leave enables men to increase participation in infant and family care. Currently, small businesses are forced to finance employee leave out of their slim profit margins or they are left at a competitive disadvantage in hiring, retention, and productivity of workers.

The Paid Family Leave Insurance Act would add family leave to New York's Temporary Disability Insurance (TDI) Program.* Paid family leave benefits will be funded solely through small employee payroll deductions. Paid Leave would give a parent time to bond with a new-

born or a newly adopted child. Fathers or mothers could take time off to a maximum of 12 weeks per year to care for new children or seriously ill family members, including spouses, siblings, domestic partners, parents, grandparents, grandchildren, or in-laws. from you. Times have changed but the workplace hasn't. Loss of income or a job can put economic stability at risk. The United States stands virtually alone in the world, and New York State lags behind other states, in failing to provide any paid time for workers with a new baby or sick relative. The federal Family and Medical Leave Act offers some help by providing up to 12 weeks of unpaid leave, but coverage is limited to workers employed for a year or longer in firms of 50 or more, leaving out 40 percent of the workforce. Because the leave is unpaid, even those who qualify often can't afford to take it.

The NY Paid Family Leave Insurance bill passed the State Assembly but not the Senate so it must be re-introduced in both chambers. Some of you may have stories to share that provide examples of the burden that fell on you when you had to manage without a paid family leave. I would be interested in hearing

from you. You might also consider sharing your story with your New York State Senator or Assembly member. You can check the following website for further information: http://www.citizenactionny.org/paidfamilyleave.**

*The bill must include an increase in the TDI benefit level. New York's TDI benefit floor has been capped at \$170 per week for the past 25 years; this lags way behind family leave benefits in other states, such as New Jersey and Rhode Island, and behind other NY benefits such as worker's compensation. Raising this cap to a modest level would carry an estimated cost of \$1.20 per week per employee; a cost that would be shared between employers and employees.

**Citizen Action NY wants to build support for bills supported by the NY Paid Family Leave Insurance Campaign (www.timetocareny.org). Other alternative bills may be introduced that will appear positive, but will not provide the benefits that families need.
