



Explore AAUW Branch Archives, December 11



You'll be amazed at our history and surely proud of our legacy. We'll meet on Thursday, December 11 at 1p.m. in 420 Capen on the UB North Campus. Enter through the Undergraduate Library on the first floor and take the elevator INSIDE the library to the fourth floor. Simple refreshments will be provided. Cost is \$5; please plan to pay at the event.

Then, if you disagree (or, for that matter, agree) with their stand, use the Two-Minute Activist or some other means to let them know you're watching! The other, perhaps even more important action is to fight for the right of every eligible voter to cast his/her ballot! If you don't/didn't have a drivers' license would you be able to produce an "approved" picture ID? If such things are required, let's make sure there's a way for people to get one - a way that costs nothing! My own mother had a copy of her birth certificate – but it wasn't the name she used all her life. I know I disagreed with the way she voted most of the time, but I'd fight for her right to cast that ballot!

Rest assured that the national AAUW will be on top of this. But they don't know OUR legislators at every level the way we do. It's up to US to make sure that our country moves forward the way we know it must!

AAUW-NYS Convention Update




DISTRICT CONFERENCE


On November 1, the District One Conference was held in the brand new SUNY Fredonia Science Center.

Achievement Gap & Policy Gap

ompared to other rich nations, the United States ranks 26th in the well-being of our children. One in four of our children are born into poverty, and our middle class is shrinking. Forty percent of our five year future. U.S. ranks 31st on availability of olds are not ready to learn. We rank 23rd in high school graduation and 19th in college graduation. Our minimum wage is flat or it has fallen while the worker has become more productive. The increase in productivity does not appear to be benefitting the income of the worker. Seventy percent of our children are living in families headed by literacy to children ages 2-8 in targeted working parents and 35 percent are raised by a single parent. These are statistics presented in a documentary series called "The Raising of America." You can view a portion of it online but it was presented at WNED-WBFO on November 10, 2014 along with a distinguished local panel of experts from various fields. The video is intended to expand the debate about what our society should do to ensure every infant the opportunity for a strong start.

The documentary carries a strong plea for guaranteed paid maternal leave, available quality childcare, and a living wage. We must invest in parents with policy changes so that the children will not grow up in an economically stressful environment. Stress during infancy is a predictor of anxiety in the child's child care and only one in ten of these facilities are inspected.

WNED/WBFO was awarded a Ready to Learn grant from the Corporation for Public Broadcasting (CPB), funded by purpose is to support math and English communities. Over the course of this coming school year, the station is partnering with Buffalo's Promise Neighborhood and Read to Succeed Buffalo to deliver and support PBS Kids Lab content for Pre-K through Grade 3 classrooms at the Buffalo Promise Neighborhood Children's Academy, Westminster Community Charter School, and Highgate Heights Elementary School.

This work is accomplished by providing a 20-unit iPad Mobile Learning Lab. WNED/WBFO will be supporting other community-based activities such as

open houses, family engagement nights, and a Summer Institute in June 2015. You can get more information at the website www.raisingofamerica.org or you can contact them at info@raisingofamerica.org. There are action toolkits, discussion guides, policy guides, promotional templates, interactive magazines, downloadable/ shareable clips, and other resources.

the U.S. Department of Education. The What is the connection to AAUW? The Family and Medical Leave Act of 1993 (FMLA) was signed into law by President Clinton after seven years of hard work by AAUW staff. It allows qualified employees to take up to 12 weeks of unpaid leave each year to care for a new baby or recently adopted child, tend to a family member, or overcome their own serious health problems. Since 1993, AAUW has worked to expand the legislation to cover more of the nation's workforce, but those lobbying efforts have been largely unsuccessful.

DECEMBER HIGHLIGHTS IN US WOMEN"S HISTORY



December 1, 1955 - Rosa Parks refuses to give up her seat on a bus to a white person; her arrest sparks the modern civil rights movement in the US.

December 5, 1935 - Mary McLeod Bethune creates the National Council of Negro Women.

December 7, 1941 - Capt. Annie Fox receives the first Purple Heart awarded to a woman for her service while under attack at Pearl Harbor.

December 10, 1869 - Wyoming is the first territory to give women the right to vote.



December 10, 1938 - Pearl S. Buck receives the Nobel Prize for Literature for The Good Earth.

December 13, 1993 - Susan A. Maxman becomes first woman president of the American Institute of Architects in its 135 year history.

December 14, 1961 - President's Commission on the Status of Women is established to examine discrimination against women and ways to eliminate it.



December 14, 1985 - Wilma Mankiller is sworn in as principal chief of the Cherokee Nation of Oklahoma, the first woman in modern history to lead a major Native American tribe.

December 17, 1993 - Judith Rodin is named president of Univ. of Pennsylvania, the first woman to head an Ivy League institution.



December 28, 1967 - Muriel Siebert becomes the first woman to own a seat on the N.Y. Stock Exchange.
