## What Does Public Policy Mean To You?

Public policy is an essential part of our daily life, most often set by legislation, executive order, bureaucratic regulation, an ordinance, or a court decision. One source says it's "the process of deciding who gets what, when, where, and how" or simply "what the government chooses to do or not to do about a specific problem."

I've been writing these articles on public policy for many months now but I have no idea if anyone is reading them. How do I know if I've had any impact on the number of local members who take action on public policy that is

within the mission of AAUW? Have you spoken out about poli-

cies that impact women and girls? Have you connected with others who are advocating on behalf of empowering women and girls? This can occur on the local, state, national, and even global level through lobbying and grassroots efforts. AAUW is proud to be sure there is an interest in of its record of empowering women since 1881 and influencing legislation that includes the Family and Medical Leave Act, the Matthew Shepard and James Byrd Jr. Hate Crimes Prevention Act, and the Lilly Ledbetter Fair Pay Act.

AAUW uses advocacy, education, philanthropy, and research to address women's needs. We need to solicit feedback locally to de-

termine whether there are members anxious to increase participation in advocacy and



development of our own public policy program. Should we expand programming to increase education on these issues? Which issues offer potential for more active involvement of members? Is it bullying, sexual assault on college campuses, access to higher education especially for women in poverty, living wage, minimum wage, pay equity, paid family leave, equitable employment opportunities, affordable hous-

> ing, health care, clean environment. campaign finance reform, open and fair

elections, equitable political participation, human trafficking, rights of immigrants, women in combat zones, special interest in millennials, baby boomers, or the most elderly in our population? We don't lack issues but we need pursuing them beyond the printed page.
