OPENING MEMBERSHIP AND MINDS
Celebrating Black History Month

Did you know that at one time, some AAUW branches refused to admit women based on race, religion, or other arbitrary considerations?

On display at the AAUW National office is a certificate from the National Council of Negro Women signed by the Council's founder and president, **Mary McLeod Bethune**. The citation recognizes AAUW for "revising its constitution to prevent membership exclusion based on race, religion, or national origin."

The story begins when **Mary Church Terrell**, one of the first African American women to earn a college degree, was invited to join the AAUW Washington, DC branch in 1946. The membership invitation caused a sharp division in the branch when some members opposed Terrell's admittance because she was African American.

The National leaders of AAUW ordered the branch to accept Mary Terrell's application or be dissolved because the bylaws had never explicitly excluded women based on race in its membership

criteria. In 1948 the DC branch sued AAUW in district court and won. AAUW appealed the court's decision but lost. With the problem still unresolved, AAUW president, **Althea Kratz Hottel**, proposed a bylaws change to clarify membership requirements. Hottel visited branches across the country to explain the bylaws revision and stressed that a vote to change them was necessary. At the 1949 National Convention in Seattle, (WA) AAUW members voted to revise the bylaws so that the only requirement for membership was to be a woman with a college degree from an AAUW-approved University. With the members voting overwhelmingly (2,168 to 65) to revise the bylaws, AAUW stood proudly with Mary Church Terrell as their first African American member.

AAUW continues until today to be committed to **its mission of advancement of equity for women and girls** through advocacy, education, philanthropy, and research.

Ethics in NYS Government

For decades, New York State government has been controlled by “three men in a room” (the governor, the State Assembly speaker, and the State Senate majority leader) who worked in secret and without accountability to decide most vital issues. Issues were often settled in these private meetings, with no opportunity for public debate.

Sheldon Silver, in his two decades as speaker of the State Assembly, seemed indestructible.

U.S. Attorney Preet Bharara said the notorious “three men in a room” arrangement that controls New York State government is to blame for Albany becoming a “cauldron of corruption”—and for the crimes that led to Assembly Speaker Sheldon Silver’s arrest. Silver used his office to mask millions of dollars in “bribes and kickbacks” as legitimate outside income from two private law firms over

more than a decade. He used his official position to obtain attorney referral fees for himself, including from clients with substantial business before the State.

Dean Skelos, ex-Senate majority leader, and his son Adam were convicted on eight counts of bribery, extortion, and conspiracy. With sentencing set for March 2, both men face a possible 130 years in prison. Skelos filed for retirement and stands to receive an estimated pension of \$95,590 a year. Although the Legislature passed a law in 2011 to strip the pensions of newly elected lawmakers convicted of corruption, it protected longtime officials like Skelos and Silver. Efforts to amend the state Constitution to



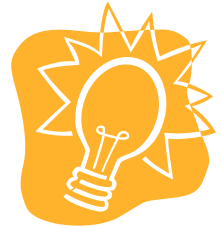
remove the pensions of all corrupt lawmakers floundered in the Legislature this year.

Bharara encourages New Yorkers to fight for reform. “The people of New York should be really disappointed. When so many of their leaders can be bought for a few thousand dollars, they should maybe be angry,” he said. “Money is often the core of the problem.” By concentrating power in the hands of so few, he added, good people are discouraged from running for office because they know they will have little influence on important matters. There was an attempt at reform with the anti-corruption Moreland Commission until the governor shut it down. Beyond lip service, where will meaningful reform come from?

I turned again to Donna Seymour, our dedicated AAUW State Public Policy chair, for her insights on ethics in New York State. She said, “Everyone is so busy pointing the finger at the other guy, we won’t get any meaningful reform until everyone acknowledges the system is broken and is producing very flawed results.”

Now that the legislature is back in session, it is up to us to monitor what happens to limit lawmakers’ outside income, bolster the independence of an ethics agency, reduce loopholes that avoid campaign contribution limits, and improve transparency of the state’s campaign finance system.

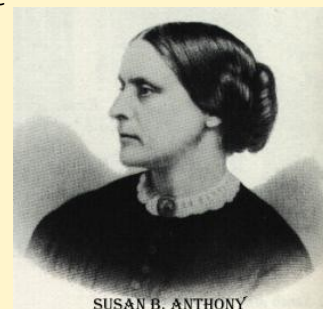

Introducing Keynote Speaker for Tech Savvy 11, CarolAnn Garratt

CarolAnn Garratt has flown around the world in a small aircraft three times to raise funds for ALS research, setting a new world record for flying her single engine plane around the globe in the shortest amount of time in December 2008.

Ms. Garratt earned her bachelor's degree in mechanical engineering from the University of Wisconsin Madison and held

many responsible positions in engineering and management.

Carol has flown since high school. She earned her private pilot license in 1978 and her instrument rating in 1980. In 1996, she completed her commercial license and bought a Mooney in 2000.

Not content to just fly, CarolAnn built her first plane in 2006. To-

day she owns and flies three different aircraft. She flies over 400 hours a year, including flying students with the *EAA Young Eagles* program, the sick and needy with *Angel Flights*, and instructing cadets with the *Civil Air Patrol*.

After her mother suffered and died from ALS, she flew around the world in 2003 to raise awareness and donations for ALS. To



date, after three circumnavigations, her speaking engagements and books about the flight have raised hundreds of thousands of dollars for ALS research.

SCHOLARSHIPS

Women in college : Some thoughts of an AAUW member

Today over half of all registered college students in the U.S. are women, with about 75 to 80% of high school seniors bound for further education.

Sixty years ago in 1955, when I graduated high school, a mere thirty students, both male and female, out of the 125 receiving diplomas went on to college.

Only six women college graduates lived in Buffalo, one of the most populous and richest American cities in 1890. That was the year when an organization called AAUW was formed to foster the advancement of women in the city. Today, 125 years later, this organization still exists with its membership of over 200 professional women who continue to encourage post secondary school education for women of Western New York.

The primary means of fostering women's education is through scholarships awarded annually to deserving high school and college graduates. Much of the money for this important endeavor comes from our sale of used

books held annually at various Buffalo locations.

Endowments, not the book sale, account for funding of other scholarships. Of these, the Olga Lindberg scholarships of \$10,000 and \$5,000 are awarded to two Western New York women in their fourth year of college study. Olga Lindberg, a UB graduate, left a legacy of learning through this scholarship grant.



Most recently, winners of this scholarship have included local women students of biology/environmental education, medicine, engineering, and education of refugees. In past years, this scholarship has gone to students of various interests including humanities, music and the arts, communication, and business.

Qualified applicants with 3.75 or above average have until April 1st to submit application, transcript, and recommendations to the AAUW Buffalo branch.
