The first International Women's Day dates back to 1908 when a group of 15,000 women marched the streets of New York City to protest long working hours, low pay, and the right to vote. The women's movement of the 1960's raised awareness of women's issues. The United Nations officially recognized March 8<sup>th</sup> as International Women's Day in 1975 to celebrate social, economic, cultural, and political achievements made by women worldwide. In 1981, Congress established Women's History Week to honor the accomplishments of women. Women's History Week was extended to the entire month of March in 1987 by Congress to highlight the contributions of women in history and contemporary society.

As an organization, AAUW is committed to advocating for equity for women and girls. The Buffalo Branch will be celebrating International Women's Day with a special program on Tuesday, March 8<sup>th</sup>. 

# PUBLIC POLICY

Let's Put the Gender Gap in Politics in Perspective

Ith Hillary Clinton in the 2016
Democratic primary, the United
States may join the UK, Germany,
Brazil, and Argentina as democracies that
have had a female as top leader. American
women are still underrepresented in elected
offices all across our nation despite being a
majority of the US population. The hard evidence shows us that progress has been very
slow. Women peaked at about 27.6%
in statewide elective offices (such as governor), according to research by Rutgers University. In 2015, that measurement is at 24.7%.
The rates are even worse for women of color.

- 1. In 2015, women held 104 of the 535 seats of Congress, which is about 19.4%. The number is barely higher for the House of Representatives, where women held 84, or 20%, of the 435 seats. Out of 100 people in the Senate, only 20 are women.
- 2. Since 1917, only 299 women have served as a U.S. representative or senator.
- 3. In the history of the United States, there have been only four female Supreme Court justices. There have been 112 justices as of 2010.
- In the 2014 midterm election, for the first time, more than 100 women finally served in Congress.
- Only 10 presidents have ever appointed a women to their cabinet, the first appointee being Frances Perkins in 1933 by Franklin D. Roosevelt.
- 6. Only 14 women in history have ever run for the highest political office possible in the United States.
- 7. The problem spans worldwide too. In 2014, only five countries out of the G20 had at least a third of women in senior leadership roles in the public sector.

According to the Wall Street Journal, part of this is due to society's being conditioned to believe that women's votes or political ambitions won't actually make tangible political changes.

Does a woman in an elected office make a difference? Various studies have shown that the presence of more women in legislatures makes a significant difference in terms of the policy that gets passed. Looking at nations that are more successful at achieving gender



parity among elected officials provides some guidance about what would transform the political environment. Leaders in electing women include Sweden (45 percent female representation at the national level), Finland (42.5 percent), Denmark and the Netherlands (39 percent) and Germany (36.5 percent). Most of their political parties prioritize recruitment of female candidates; some even require "positive quotas" where half their candidates are women. Their societies have policies in areas like childcare that make it easier for legislators to balance their service with their families.

Columbia University researchers found that for the most ethnically diverse nations, having a woman in the top national leadership position was correlated with a 6.8 percent greater increase in GDP growth in comparison to nations with a male leader. The authors attribute that to women leaders having a more participatory, democratic style than men, and more confidence from voters at managing difficult situations that require more cooperative approachers.

A former American Political Science Association president found strong correlations between more women legislators and more progressive policy on issues like the environment, macroeconomic management, comprehensive support for families and individuals, violence prevention, and incarceration. Other studies have found that women legislators—both Republican and Democrat—introduce more bills *Continued on Page 5*

than men in the areas of civil rights and liberties, education, health, labor, and more.

How can we elect more women? We've seen decades of heroic efforts by organizations like EMILY's List and Feminist Majority to recruit, train, and fund more women candidates and

combat gender stereotypes in politics and in the media. Women's political organizations fought in the 1970s and 80s against the Democrats' old boy network for nomination of more women candidates, as well as equal representation in party committees and structures, eventually succeeding in

creating more internal female leadership (which can be a steppingstone to public office.) To an extent, these cumulative endeavors have paid off in an increase in representation in Congress.

The executive editor for *Ms*. magazine says the power of incumbency and the strong old boys' network is very resistant to structural change. She thinks voters increasingly see

women as effective legislators, taking the lead in forging cross-partisan consensus on issues like the debt limit, but the male-dominated networks stand in the way of fair voting methods. Public financing of campaigns also would help, since most women don't have access to the good old boy networks that pri-

marily fund political campaigns. It should be noted that more women in politics does not necessarily correlate with lower levels of corruption. Rather, democratic and transparent politics is correlated with low levels of corruption, and the two create an enabling environment

for more women to participate.

America now ranks ninety-eighth in the world for percentage of women in its national legislature, down from 59th in 1998. We're just behind Kenya and Indonesia, and barely ahead of the United Arab Emirates.
