


#### **CAROL'S CORNER**

# The Future of American Higher Education


All AAUW members have significant knowledge of campus life, so this month I'm recommending a provocative book published in this past year — "Fail U. - The False Promise of Higher Education" by Charles J. Sykes. You may not agree with every part of his indictment of higher education, but he provides well-researched detail to support a convincing critique of colleges and universities. Sykes is a senior fellow at the Wisconsin Policy Research Institute and a talk show host in Milwaukee.

Let's start with the cost of a college degree that has increased by 1,125 percent since 1978, four times the rate of inflation, resulting in an average student debt of more than \$30,000. Where did the money go? Not on instruction but on an increase in administrators with an array of new titles such as vice-presidents or directors of student success, diversity, inclusion, collaborative engagement, etc. "Other professionals" increased by 240 percent. Spending on buildings, amenities, promotions, athletics, and non-instructional student services has exploded.

Between 2004 and 2014, the number of student borrowers grew by 92 percent and the average student loan grew 74 percent. Sykes states the student loan debt now exceeds both the nation's total credit card and auto loan debt with a likely impact on the economy for decades to come. Furthermore, many of these students have chosen majors with highly unlikely paybacks, and find themselves working in jobs that did not require a bachelor's degree. He and others suggest that the current education bubble may be worse than the housing bubble. He notes that student borrowers, unlike those

who sought a mortgage, do not have to provide any evidence that they have the ability to pay back the loan.

Should we continue to encourage everyone to go to college when many students are not improving their skills in critical thinking, complex reasoning, and writing? The proliferation of undemanding, unchallenging courses keeps classrooms stocked with warm tuition-paying bodies. Thirty percent of students with C grades in high school and 15 percent with a grade point average of C-minus or lower have been admitted into four-year colleges.




Although professors may deny it, Sykes found that many have settled into a seven-and-a-half hour workweek, often negotiating for more time for their research, thus leaving many undergraduate courses to be taught by adjuncts and teaching assistants. It is worth noting that recent research suggests that fully half the scientific research papers do not have a single reader after they are published.

Sykes devotes a chapter to the new intellectual intolerance on college campuses, another chapter to the new rules for sexual assault such as absurdity of affirmative consent standards in actual practice. He claims these policies carry the danger of undermining due process and accepting victims'

allegations at face value. You will read about the culture of victimization on campuses, trigger warnings, our assumption of fragility of our best and brightest, microaggressions, and the snowflake rebellion.

Sykes quotes William Bennett, who noted in 1987, that the problem with higher education is not that it is underfunded, but that it is under-accountable and under-productive. Sykes has recommendations for change and reform that involve the organizational structure, the role of trustees, alumni, legislators, parents, faculty, employers, scholars, donors, and the rest of us. It's worth the read!

## VISITING SENECA FALLS TO JOIN WOMEN'S MARCH

I chose to attend the Women's March in Seneca Falls, NY because that spot has special significance for me. I have a photo of myself, my mother, and her long ago friend from college taken in 1991 shortly after the Elizabeth Cady Stanton House was restored. We took a day trip to Seneca Falls to honor the women of Seneca Falls who proclaimed the Declaration of Sentiments there in 1848.

For a number of years I was on the National Board of the Women's Rights Historical Park. While holding that position I made many trips to Seneca Falls for board meetings and events. I felt I had to march at Seneca Falls this past weekend for the Women's March.

The morning rally was held within the walls of the Wesleyan Chapel. Here the Declaration of Sentiments affirming rights for women was read in 1848. There were 75 women at the time - including Susan B. Anthony and Elizabeth Cady Stanton - and 32 men, including Frederick Douglass, who signed that Declaration.

At Saturday's march, Marilyn Tedeschi, the current president of the Friends of the Women's Rights National Park, quoted Susan B. Anthony and said "It is impossible to fail." Indeed, on that day it seemed that the causes represented on the many, many signs held aloft could not fail. One of the speakers, Dr. Sally Roesch Wagner, made the connection between this spot in Central New York State - the birthplace of the Women's Movement - with the traditional Iroquois (Haudenosaunee) culture of that area. Dr. Roesch told us that Haudenosaunee clan mothers nominate chiefs who go on to

represent their clans in the Grand Council. She told us the qualifications: first, they cannot have committed a theft; second, they cannot have committed a murder. Third, they cannot have sexually abused a woman. Good guidelines!

A Native American Drum Circle, Friends of Mother Earth, performed that day to continue the Native American connection.

The day also featured a woman named Marie, who was 101 years old and had marched with her mother when the Women's Suffrage amendment was ratified. She spoke to us and told us to "keep on marching."

After the rally we marched to the Presbyterian Church in Seneca Falls where Alice Paul spoke in 1923 asking for support for an Equal Rights amendment. Sadly, we do not have one yet.

Space was limited inside the church, so the bulk of the crowd, including myself, watched the program on a jumbotron outside. We were grateful for the pleasant

weather. Karen Magee, president of New York State United Teachers, reminded us of the precious right of all children to an excellent, free public education. A mother who brought her severely handicapped son to the rally told us of her fight to gain access to a quality education for her son within the public school system. The owner of a Finger Lakes Winery recited her poem about the

migrant grape pickers she hired.

Shari Scavone of the WNY Women's Foundation, who organized my trip, spoke eloquently of the work of the foundation and then encouraged each of us to find a girl to mentor. It can make all the difference, she said.

From Facebook reports, newspapers, and TV, I know what a successful day Jan. 21 was in Washington, D.C. and at the sister march sites all over the world. I'm glad I chose Seneca Falls, the birthplace of women's rights for our country.


