


LAUREN BELFER

CAROL'S CORNER




October is Breast Cancer Awareness month. We will see a profusion of pink everywhere with merchandise to promote good breast health and to encourage proactive health behaviors. We hear about the importance of breast self-examinations and mammograms.

Although Breast Cancer Awareness gets more attention and publicity, October is also Domestic Violence Awareness month. There is a stigma attached to domestic violence and the violence thrives when victims are silent. Perhaps many individuals would like to help promote awareness of domestic violence and abuse but do not know where to start. Some suggestions include:

- 1. Talk to boys and girls about relationships and encourage them to make good choices around drinking and socializing that will discourage them from being victimized.
- 2. Donate to a domestic violence shelter.
- 3. Volunteer at a domestic violence shelter or call center.

- 4. Read a book on domestic violence and abuse issues.
- 5. Purchase items such as shirts, pins, tote bags, or coffee mugs that symbolize domestic violence awareness.





The Buffalo Branch has collected donations for the Family Justice Center over the past several years to assist their clients. Toiletries and cosmetics have been the most frequently donated items. At our September Welcome Dinner, we had a food drive to help supply their food pantry. Every donation that is made lets the victims of abuse and violence know that someone is thinking of them. The Buffalo Branch will continue to collect items throughout the year. A "wish list" supplied by the FJC was published in the September *Advocate*. Donations will continue to be accepted at all board meetings and programs.

CYNTHIA'S INSIGHTS

WOMEN WHO LAUNCHED AMERICA INTO SPACE

Who Really Designed Those Space Ships??? We have all heard the phrase "Behind every great/successful man there is a woman." Well,

think of this: "Behind every American Rocket, there were American women."

Just as students from schools are given a summer reading list, I had a reading list for myself which included the book Rise of the Rocket Girls, by Nathalia Holt. The title would lead one to believe that it was about women who had participated in traveling into space aboard one of the many rockets. Well, to my surprise, it was about women who were top mathematicians from World War II (the 1940's) until the 1970's.

The story begins: During World War II, a new company, Jet Propulsion Laboratory, needed quick-thinking mathematicians to calculate jet velocities and plot missile trajectories. Nor-

mally, you would think that only men would be considered for these positions. But this company recruited an elite group of young women to do this job. These women were known as "Human Computers." During a period of approx-

imately three decades, these women, with only pencils, paper, and their mathematical intelligence, transformed rocket design and helped bring about America's first ballistic missiles. They were primarily interested in space exploration and when JPL became part of a new agency called NASA, these "computers" worked on the first probes to the moon, Venus, Mars, and beyond. Later, as digi-

tal computers replaced these "Human Computers," Jet Propulsion Laboratory continued to employ these brilliant women and trained them to be the first computer programmers and engineers!



LET'S GET OUT THE VOTE!

That's what AAUW members are telling those millennial women to get them to vote. As we all know, millennials are the least likely to vote.

Some studies have concluded that millennials

are about as interested in politics as young people in prior generations, and about as politically active outside of election time. Politicians need to find ways to encourage them to vote, to make it clear that their vote/voice



matters. Voting isn't that difficult to fit into a busy schedule of two jobs, school, family/friends and other activities. We could make registration easier for young people who are likely to move often. Maybe millennials simply don't believe that voting makes any difference. When candidates speak to the concerns and interests of the millennials, more are drawn into the electoral process. Maybe they need help to understand the relevance of their issues, and politicians need to use multimedia to reach them more effectively. Maybe our schools aren't preparing them adequately to understand the issues even

though there is a greater emphasis on community engagement and service learning.

Millennials may also take the power of voting for granted. We're almost 100 years away from

> the women's suffrage movement and The Voting Rights Act of 1965 is over 50 years old. The 26th Amendment moved the voting age from 21 to 18 in response to Vietnam War protesters who felt they should be able to

vote for the officials who could send them off to war. Voter ID laws do currently threaten the right to vote, but all the other historical facts happened too long ago for millennials to have fought for them or even thought about them.

Millennials need to feel inspired or threatened and maybe not only millennials, but all of us, need better candidates who really speak to the issues.


BUFFALO BRANCH SCHOLARSHIPS

In addition to having an outstanding academic record, Rebecca has devoted a considerable amount of her time in service to her college, church, and community. She is president of the Volunteers in Action service club and works weekly mentoring low-income children through the Big Friends—Little Friends program. Her faith-based service is evident through an extensive Confirmation Retreat experience she plans and conducts for six parishes in Scranton. During spring break we find her in Vineland, NJ, volunteering for Habitat for Community. It is obvious she has a passion for helping others!

Her goal is to be a speech pathologist working with children having speech impairments. We congratulate her on her impressive application and wish her much success in the future.

The Olga Lindberg \$10,000 Scholarship

Dominique Bertrand's journey to higher education at UB where she is a Ph.D. student in the Anthropology Department has been a long, difficult one, but no personal setbacks of health or finances deterred her from persevering with her goals of studying the effect of wild life tourism on animal behavior. Her research was conducted in Indonesia (and the Buffalo Zoo) where she studied an endangered species of primates, the macaque, to learn how human contact with this animal altered its behavior.

Success as a exemplary student, researcher, and teacher is evidenced by her many awards and honors. Habits of hard work and organizational skills were developed in the business sector where Dominique ("Niki") started her own company. Those acquired skills were put into action in grad-

uate school where she actively worked in student government, encouraged communication between undergrads and graduate students, and empowered women anthropologists to be more pro-active in conferences and presentations.

Dominque's commitment to women's advancement is through her mentoring in and out of the classroom and in her work helping international students at UB. In Indonesia, her friendliness and helpfulness proved an asset in encouraging village women's self-confidence.

This year's Olga Lindberg award goes to "Niki" Bertrand who, in her own words, "embraces the role of women in science" and opens up experiences for the "underrepresented students"..."to break down barriers" for women no matter their cultural background or economic status.

The Olga Lindberg \$5,000 Scholarship

As an English/Spanish Education major, Lisa Kulka has used her skills of language and communication to enhance the lives of refugees in the Buffalo school system where she not only assists teachers, but also teaches classes of her own on how to prepare for college work. This opportunity to serve a much needed refugee community has led Lisa to personally know and encourage the parents and adults in their newly adopted American culture. Her own personal life challenges of taking on multiple responsibilities in her family have strengthened her perseverance in overcoming difficulties, thus making Lisa qualified through life experience to empathize and guide others with also complex lives.

As an active member of Women in Science and Engineering, Lisa has fostered women's career advancement in STEM, and helped the AAUW Buffalo Branch's work in this regard. She set up a Restorative Justice Circle between students and teachers as a counseling vehicle. As a Ph.D. in Education candidate, Lisa has worked as operations coordinator of the UB Liberty Partnerships program helping at-risk students, and has developed curriculum and served as translator for Upgrade Academics, Inc. Such involvement in community while still a graduate student requires organizational and

communication skills of an effective, mature professional.
