THE BEST BOOK SALE EVER!

The 62nd annual Scholarship Book Sale once again outdid itself – the best ever!

Led by the executive committee of Roberta

Travis, Cindy Koch, Mary Georger, Janet Ostrow, Judy Huber, and Betty Preble, we took in a record \$74,000 including presales. Of course, there were expenses. The major ones were rent (\$4000,) moving books and materials between Kensington-Bailey and the sale site (\$5760,) printing and postage (\$700,) table rentals (\$5500,)

rent at K-B (\$1000,) and security (\$1221.) Still, we netted around \$55,000. \$5000 of that will go to the winner of our Jacquie

Walker scholarship, while another \$3500 goes directly to our Funds for Education account. The rest will support some of our other scholarships and grants plus community programs such as Tech Savvy and Sister-to-Sister.

The sale could not continue every year without the continued dedication of past committee members. I know I'll miss some and I apologize, but I certainly want to mention Pat Baker, Pat Swift-MacClennan, Judy Clare, Jill Brown, Judy Wei-

demann, Jean Hubbard, Barbara Carier, and Sue Oliver. They make things look so easy!

Once again our members and other volunteers came through for us. 110 of our members (more than half) participated in some way, and another 68 non-members joined in the party. The hours spent are staggering – 871 at Kensington-Bailey, 2406 during the pre-sale setup period at the site, 1089 during the sale itself, and then another 60 during cleanup – 4,426 hours!!! That includes **four** people with at least 250 or more hours, plus another **five** with between 100 and 250 hours. And we know that's an understatement since people often forgot to sign in. It takes a lot of people and a lot of work to organize and sell an estimated **181,000 books**!

Although we were biting our nails in March, not having yet found a site, we ended up with the best one in anyone's memory. The former Carolina Furniture Store was almost exactly the right size – and it was clean and light! The parking situation was a dream-come-true.

There were problems with the air-conditioning system, but

the property manager (WS Development) made it OK by sending out industrial fans! And there was one room without lighting, but

three handy husbands (Chris Georger, Peter Ostrow, and John Preble) managed to string floodlights from above, which took care of that problem. Of course, there was the problem of the two breakins, but Roberta Travis and the Amherst police made sure that things were secured properly afterwards. We are just grateful the intruders didn't start a fire!

The left-over process this year was in cooperation with Discover-Books.com, a company recommended by Jan Vine, who knew of them through work with the

Schenectady Branch. (Networking pays!) We had to pack the books, but they took care of everything else. That brought in another \$1000 – they will donate some, sell some online, and recycle the rest. We hope to work with them again this coming year.

Mark your calendars for May 31 - June 4, our 63rd sale! And be prepared to start collecting and sorting Tuesday and Wednesday mornings starting Sep 20-21. Details (and a more comprehensive report of this year's sale) should be on the website as you read this.

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
PUBLIC POLICY

LET'S GET OUT THE VOTE!

I can't be the only AAUW member who is having difficulty convincing a Millennial (and others) in the family to **vote on November 8**. Voter turnout in this country has been abysmal but it usually improves to around 50 percent (still discouraging) in presidential years. You must admit that this year is unique in many respects.

First, we need to make sure citizens are registered and educated so they can actually exercise their right to vote effectively. AAUW has been a strong voice promoting education and equity for women and girls since 1881, influ-

encing public debate and taking positions on the fundamental issues.



But how do we get them out there to vote on November 8?

Candidates' positions on the issues are determined using their voting records, public statements, and campaign position papers, as well as information posted by trusted sources on the Internet. All campaigns

are contacted via email in advance of publication.

Unfortunately some states have taken initiatives to make it more difficult to vote, and there is room for improvement in other states such as New York. The Voter Empowerment Act could improve voter registration. For example, we have the technology to add nearly

We can take steps to ensure that voters know the registration rules in their state, their voting rights, and what to bring to the polls on Election Day. (Remember those who turned out for the primary and were disappointed when they were

unable to vote.) There are nonpartisan issue forums, debates, and meet-the-

candidate events in the communities. AAUW and the AAUW Action Fund provide materials and tools to engage and motivate voters, including It's My Vote buttons, issue-based stickers, social media efforts, and regular mailings and e-mails with pertinent election information.

On a personal level, why not offer to take a friend, family member, or millennial to their polling place and take time to celebrate your achievement over a drink or dessert?

The AAUW NYS Summer Leadership Conference is held annually for officers, board members, and interested members of all branches within New York State. Cazenovia College hosted the conference and it was an ideal location. Cazenovia is approximately 20 miles southeast of Syracuse which makes a great central location for attendees. Cazenovia Lake is picturesque and a short walk from the cam-

pus. The Village of Cazenovia has a charm of its own with independently owned shops and restaurants.

Four members of the Buffalo Branch attended: Laurie Eikemeyer, branch

The weekend program started with dinner on Friday and continued through lunch on Sunday. There was ample time to attend sessions and socialize with other AAUW members from

The conference theme was "Building Success with Smart Ideas" with a focus on programming and leadership. salaries and close the wage gap.

bop to the UN and Beyond. She was born and raised in Minnesota and ventured into New York City to study music at Julliard. She became a successful jazz pianist. After seeing poverty and misery in third world countries, she became an economic development officer for the United Nations. Her slide show was entertaining and informative. Dede is a member of the Westchester Branch and resides in Ossining, NY.

One of the advantages of attending a state meeting is the networking opportunities with members from other branches. Members share ideas of successful strategies for various branch activities such as programs, membership recruitment, and fundraising activities.
