Presidents 's Perspective

What would Eleanor say?

As we look back at this election, with hateful and vicious words on both sides of almost every contest — and as we look forward to hearing Eleanor Roosevelt "up close and personal" in December, it might be worth looking at some of the words we know she did say:

"We must learn to work together, all of us, regardless of race or creed or color; we must wipe out, wherever we find it, any feeling that grows up, of intolerance, or belief that one group can go ahead alone," ER told a conference of educators in 1934. "We go ahead together or we go down together."

Dismissing "the America First people," she pressed for international understanding. Taking aim at bias and bigots, she endorsed "the four equalities": voting rights, equal education, equal opportunity, and justice before the law.

Any type of prejudice, in race or religion, endangered not just specific targets but everyone, she wrote in 1939; "the real wrong is done to democracy and our nation as a whole." On visiting an Arizona internment camp in 1943, ER drafted an article that voiced her disquiet. To fear other Americans, ER wrote, challenged every citizen's "right to our basic freedoms" and undercut US capacity to "furnish a pattern for the rest of the world."

How did we stray so far from her inspiring words and work? What kind of a pattern are we furnishing for the rest of the world? Have we reached the bottom yet? How can we climb out of this pit we've dug ourselves into?

AAUW lists its values as "Nonpartisan, Fact-based, Integrity, Inclusion, and Intersectionality." If these are truly our



values (and I hope they are), what can we do to spread them? I submit that our action plan should include sticking to the truth, not spreading unfounded rumors, listening to others' opinions with respect and keeping a positive tone no matter how difficult. "Basket of deplorables", "extraordinarily low IQ person", "What a stupid question", "Neanderthal" – among the phrases heard in the past couple of years that have no place in productive political discourse.

As we look forward to the next elections, let's promise ourselves to try to keep the high road. Calmly refute untruths, fact-check rumors on the internet rather than blindly sharing them, and state why we should vote **for** a candidate rather than how the opponent is less worthy. If we in AAUW can't do things right, we certainly can't expect others to do so!

Tech Savvy 14: Saturday, March 16, 2019

We will welcome about 500 girls in 6th – 9th grade for the middle school program and approximately 100 10th-12th graders in the Tech Savvy Girls on a Roll program. We are also expecting up to 200 parents and teachers. This is all in the name of encouraging STEM for girls with a fun theme that is all about girls working together, inspiring each other, and creating all things new and better



The conference is designed to inspire middle school girls to pursue STEM careers (science, technology, engineering, and math)—and to provide adults in their lives with relevant information. Tech Savvy features 20+ workshops for the girls plus four savvy skills workshops, introducing critical life success skills such as advocacy, negotiating, interview preparation, and ethical decision making. Since Tech Savvy is not just for students, adults will enjoy fun and enlightening sessions that include the best of ways to help girls in their lives.

You might say that this year's keynote speaker knows a little about inspiring and creating... and she knows A LOT about being a girl! Gitanjali Rao is 13 years old and is an 8th grader. Last year, as a student at STEM School Highlands Ranch in Highlands Ranch, Colorado, Anjali was named America's Top Young Scientist of 2017 by the Discovery Education 3M. She won the Young Scientist Challenge with a device to detect lead in water faster than any other current techniques.



Reflections on Voter Fraud, Voter Suppression and System Inefficiencies By Marian Deutschman

Wikipedia defines voter suppression as "a strategy to influence the were not working at all and they outcome of an election by discouraging or preventing specific groups of people from voting." Voter fraud is illegal interference with the process of an election of the favored candidate, depressing the vote share of the rival candidates, or both. What constitutes ed. electoral fraud varies from country to country. Some groups argue that voter fraud is widespread. The Heritage Foundation has said that the United States has a long history of election fraud and that preventing and prosecuting such fraud is essential to protecting the integrity of our voting process. The Brennan Center for Justice carefully examined allegations of fraud to get at the truth behind the claims. The conclusion was clear — most allegations are baseless.

There were thousands of reports of voting irregularities across the country this year, with voters complaining of broken machines, long lines and untrained poll workers challenging Americans' right to vote. The loudest complaints came from Georgia. Some voters waited three hours to cast ballots after local election officials initially sent only three voting machines to serve more than 3,000 registered voters. In one suburban tion of civil rights groups reported county in Georgia, the wait was over four hours as election officials opened the polls only to dis-

cover that their voting machines did not have enough paper. These locations serve predominantly African American voters, causing worries that specific groups were being disenfranchised. It was uneither by increasing the vote share clear how many of the complaints were legitimate and how many voters and outcomes were affect-



Some of the concerns started with restrictive voting laws passed by Republicans in recent years. Republicans have said the tough new rity records. Last year, Georgia rules are necessary to combat voter fraud. Yet we know that studies have found no evidence of widespread fraud.

Election officials in some states extended voting hours to accommodate long lines at polling locations. Some polling places ran out of ballots, leaving hundreds of voters in line long after the 8 p.m. poll closing time. A national coalireceiving more than 29,000 complaints of voting irregularities including reports of nonfunctioning

machines in numerous states.

New York smashed voter turnout records when nearly 6 million New Yorkers showed up to vote, a 45% increase from the 2014 midterms. Over 38 million Americans cast their ballot before November 6th. Since we don't have early voting, not a single New Yorker was one of them. In New York City voting precincts were hampered by broken scanners in all five boroughs.

Georgia's Secretary of State and Republican candidate for governor, had not processed over 53,000 voter registration applications because of mismatches in the name. Applications were suspended, most of them belonging to people of color or immigrants, under a new state law requiring an exact match between the application and driver or Social Secupassed its "exact match" law, which requires that people's name on their government-issued IDs must accurately match the name on the voter rolls.

According to the Pew Center, America's voter registration system needs an upgrade. It is plagued with errors and inefficiencies. It has not kept pace with advancing technology and a mobile society.
